Debt Has Increased. "The Dominion debt has increased in leaps and bounds under the present Government. It increased ten millions during the month of January this year while the expenditure increased four millions. On the other hand, the revenue was decreased by two millions. We have the largest debt per capita of any country in the world. In 1911 it was \$12.47 and in 1913, \$17.60. Canada today is the monopolists Gowganda. There were 56 mergers between the years 1908 and 1812 into which 248 companies entered. Their aggregate capital was 168 mil-But when these 248 companies were boiled down to 56 companies, their total capital jumped to 457

Take the Canada Cement Company, for instance. It is composed of eleven companies and has a capital of 38 millions, but before the merger, these companies had a total capital of only

7% millions. The Ames-Holden shoe concern with two companies had a capital of three and a half millions, but this was inflated to eleven and a half millions with the combine. How Prices Are Controlled.

"And these companies," continued Mr. Charlton, "pay dividends on this inflated capitalization, and by eliminating competition have control of output and prices. There is not an equitable distribution of wealth in the Dominion. The capitalists wish by a restricted tariff, to monopolize the markets and to place their own value on their products.

The farmer is really the only man who cannot eliminate competition from who cannot eliminate competition from the competition fair his business. Therefore give him fair play with regard to the law of supply and demand. Let the producer sell in the dearest market and the consumer buy in the cheapest.

RUSSIA IS STIRRED UP

Minister of Justice Arrives at Klev

to Sift the Evidence-Relative of Beiless in Jail. [Canadlan Press.]

Kiev, Feb. 15.—The murder of the boy at Fastoff, which, it is alleged, was committed for ritualistic purposes, is assuming the dimensions of the Beiliss case. As in the earlier tragedy, stories of mysterious characters have been introduced, such as "a red-headed man" and "a lamplighter," both of which have disappeared. The Black Hundred and the Union of Russion people are shewing their old-time anti-semite activity.

The minister of justice, J. G. Chtchegievitoff, and other judicial officials have araived at Klev and are sifting the evidence. On their arrival they were acclaimed by deputations from the Union of Russian People and the Two-Headed Eagle organization. The leaders of the Black Hundred, after first asserting that the victim was a Christian, subsequently declared that he was a Jew and that he had been murdered by Jews in connection with the Beiliss case for the purpose of disproving the allegations that in the so-called ritual murders Christians were invariably selected.

A Relative of Beiliss.

They are also seeking to prove that Pashkoff, the Jewish tailor, who has been

arrested on the charge of being impli-cated in the murder, is a relative of Beiliss.

Another indication that the present case is likely to be a repetition of the Beiliss case is found in the fact that the two opposing counsels in the Beiliss trial, the Black Hundred barrister, G. Zamislovsky, Black Hundred Palliss M. Zerundy and the defender of Beiliss, M. Zarundy, have arrived at Kiev. Newspaper correspondents are thronging to Fastoff. respondents are thronging to Faston.

#### SIX MILLION OF WHITEFISH
