FOUND NOTHING WRONG AT GERMAN PIERS

New York officials visiting belligerent vessels in harbor.

(Canadian Press.)

New York, March 8.—Collectors of the Port Malone said last night that the customs inspectors who Saturday boarded the interned German steamships Vatterland and George Washington had found them at Hoboken, found their condition satisfactory to the Government.

The visit of the inspectors, composing the so-called neutrality squad, to the

piers of the German lines was in the course of a round of visits they had been ordered to pay to the piers of lines of various nationalities on the harbor front here, including those of the British and French as well as the German lines, the collector said, and was not in consequence of reports of any special activities at the German lines' piers.

GERMAN ATTACK TURNED TO DEFEAT

Thrilling Story of a French Victory At Notre Dame de Lorette.

3,000 OF ENEMY SLAIN

Trenches Lost By Allies Are Regained In Magnificent Counter-Attacks.

(Canadian Press.)

Paris, March 8.—The manner in which a furious German attack at Notre Dame de Lorette was transformed into a defeat in which 3,000 Germans fell, is described in the Petit Parisien by one of the combatants.

"The Germans blew in by mines our first line of trenches," says the story. "Before the echoes of the explosion had died away an avalanche of Germans poured down and forced the French into the second line of trenches, after a fierce hand-to-hand struggle. The Germans suddenly raked the trenches with two machine-guns, forcing the defenders into the third line, from which they were forced to retire on an easily-defensible position in the rear, after another bayonet battle with superior numbers."

Preparations Made.

"In no way demoralized, our men spent the night preparing to win back the lost position which the Germans strengthened with sand bags. Our artillery was placed in position ready to fire. As soon as dawn broke 3-inchers opened with salvoes. The shells burst in our old trenches, preparing the Germans methodically. Then the heavy artillery joined in the demoralizing. Their artillery tried to reply, and its shells exploded with awe-inspiring noise, but did no harm."

Got Their Line.

"The din became appalling. Our pieces fired as rapidly as they could be loaded. After hours of this, the guns stopped firing and our infantry bounded forward, crouching on their hands and knees. The Germans fired volley after volley, working their quick-firers feverishly, but our men would not be denied. They took the third line, but could go no farther. The second was well sand-bagged and crummed with Germans."

Fearful Struggle.

"Our artillery then began again to drop shells on the Germans with mathematical precision. Fifty yards from us we could see them blown into the air. The second night fell, and we could see nothing for the sky was covered with heavy clouds from which rain poured in torrents. In spite of all this our infantry resumed the attack and in a splendid charge reached the second line. It was a fearful struggle in the dark. Shaken by our impetuous charge, the Germans who had not been killed or wounded fled toward the holes which had been made by their mines, to which they clung in the indescribable uproar."

Terrifying Sight.

"The fearless French again dashed forward on the enemy. In the darkness the Germans struck frantically around them, killing their own men whom they were unable to recognize. After a few minutes of carnage the Germans fled for their positions, leaving the ground covered with dead and wounded. An impressive silence fell over the battlefield, while 15 haggard prisoners were led to the rear."

"Dawn revealed a terrifying sight. Everywhere the Germans lay, many falling with rifles clapped in their stiffened hands, as if about to fire again. They paid dearly for their attack, for 2,000 of them fell under our fire. Their losses were three times greater than ours, although we had to deliver three counter-attacks."

THOUSANDS IN SERBIA DYING FROM DISEASE

Sanitary Commission Needed If the Scourge Is To Be Stamped Out.

(Canadian Press.)

London, March 8.—The Daily Chronicle publishes the following dispatch from Salonica:

"Thousands are dying in Serbia, and if disease is to be stamped out a sanitary commission seems imperative."

Commenting on this, the Chronicle says: "Confirmation of our correspondent's statement was obtained from G. N. Trevelyan, the eminent historian and authority on the Balkans, who has just returned from a tour through Serbia. Infectious diseases are rife and thousands are more or less infected. Mr. Trevelyan said:

"The Austrians are primarily responsible for this dreadful state of affairs. The diseases were partly engendered by the congestion following upon the rush of refugees from the scene of Austrian atrocities."

TAX ON MANUFACTURERS.

"A bill has been submitted to the German Reichstag imposing a special tax on the profits of manufacturers war materials. The tax is retroactive, tax commissioners already obtaining returns from all firms which have been supplying the army and navy since August."

FOOD RIOTS BECOMING NUMEROUS IN SPAIN

The Economic Situation Gets More Serious—Families On Verge of Starvation.

(Canadian Press.)

Madrid, via Paris, March 8.—The economic situation in Spain is becoming steadily more serious, notwithstanding the efforts of the Government to find a solution for the difficulties which confront the country. It is feared in some quarters that conditions soon will become so bad that they may lead to a conflict fraught with grave consequences.

Dispatches from the provinces tell of numerous riots resulting from the high cost of food. In some interior districts and in the Canary Islands these people get food only every other day. Many families are said to be living on herbs and roots.

FIRE ALMOST OUT; LA TOURAINE SAFE

Vessel Is Steaming To Havre At Speed of Fourteen Knots.

(Canadian Press.)

London, March 8.—2:36 p.m.—The fire on board the Portuguese cruiser, La Touraine, has been almost extinguished, and the vessel is steaming to Havre, at a speed of 14 knots.

The information here given is the latest report received in Paris; it was sent at 10 o'clock last night by wireless telegraph from a cruiser which is escorting La Touraine.

PORTUGUESE CRUISER TO PROTECT OPORTO

Proclamation of New Republic Causes Action—Coalition Ministry Urged.

(Canadian Press.)

Barcelona, via Paris, March 8.—The Diario de Madrid, published at Madrid, on the Portuguese frontier, announces that the Government of Portugal has sent the cruiser Adamastor to Oporto as a measure of precaution.

Oporto is the second city of Portugal, and is by far the largest place in the northern part of the country. The Republic of Northern Portugal was proclaimed Saturday by a Congress of Democrats meeting at Lamego, 46 miles east of Oporto, and it is presumed the warship is intended as one means of combating this movement.

MINISTER RESIGNS.

(Canadian Press.)

Lisbon, March 8.—Via Paris.—The political situation in Portugal, which last week entered upon a serious epoch with the inauguration of the "Republic of Northern Portugal" under the presidency of Gen. Antonio Barreto, has in no sense been improved by the resignation of Minister of Finance Gallardo, which became known yesterday. As a matter of fact a further cabinet crisis now would force developments, the outcome of which would be fraught with much damage.

Want Coalition Ministry.

The assumption of the duties of finance minister by the Minister of Foreign Affairs may help the situation, but nevertheless there is a general demand for the formation of a national coalition ministry, to be supported by the parties, or else a distinct policy of maintenance of the present ministry, provided it will agree to act in close collaboration with Congress.

Should this latter course be adopted, Congress would have to meet in extraordinary session at once. In the meantime efforts of King and the Government is taking the customary measures to preserve order.

TWENTY-EIGHT FACE CONSPIRACY CHARGE

Terre Haute Politicians On Trial For Alleged Attempt To Corrupt Elections.

(Canadian Press.)

Indianapolis, March 8.—Twenty-eight Democratic and Progressive politicians of Terre Haute were placed on trial this forenoon before Judge A. E. Anderson in United States District Court, charged with conspiracy to corrupt the elections in Terre Haute last November.

The defendants and the positions they held at the time of their indictment are: Donn M. Roberts, mayor of Terre Haute and an avowed candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor in 1915; Ed H. Redman, judge of the Vigo County circuit; Dennis Shea, sheriff of Vigo County; E. E. Talbot, city controller of Terre Haute; Maurice Walsh, county sealer of weights and measures, and treasurer Democratic campaign committee; Harry S. Montgomery, president board of works; John M. Masselink, city sealer and former state representative; Thomas C. Smith, city judge; George Ehrenhardt, member of board of works; Edward R. Driscoll, secretary Democratic county committee; Hilton Redman, attorney, and son of Judge Redman; Charles Houghton, assistant custodian city hall; Louis Nunneley, assistant city engineer; Joseph O'Mara, street commissioner; Fred Morris, employee city engineer's office; William S. Crockett, city cemetery employee; Richard Knuckley, saloon clerk; Alexander Axel, alias Steel, inspector street paving; Arthur Gillis, election board clerk; John E. Greene, store proprietor; George Sawyer, saloon keeper; Timothy Conway, former pugilist; Joseph Strauss, liquor salesman; George Woodall, saloon keeper; William P. O'Brien, saloon keeper; William Doyle, Pearl McKay and Andrew O'Brien.

The occupation of the last three defendants is styled "ganbar" by the Government.

The case against the politicians resulted from a federal grand jury investigation, which was started November 12, the indictment being returned December 24, naming 126 men. Of these 116 were arrested, 88 pleading guilty and 28 not guilty. One of the men not arrested, Clem Legg, was killed by another defendant, William Bunkley, during a fight over a dog. Bunkley was acquitted of the charge of murder, and since pleaded guilty to the federal indictment.
