Accident Occurs On the Main Street of Edinburgh, Ind.

Dixie Flyer, Loaded to Capacity, On Way From Indianapolis to Louisville.

60 persons were injured, two of them probably fatally, and several seriously, last night at 10:40 o'clock, when a Pennsylvania freight train crashed into the Dixie Flyer, a fast Indianapolis, Colum-bus and Southern Traction car carrying a trailer, at a track intersection

The fiver was on route from Indianapolis to Louisville, and was carrying many persons who had been at Indianapolis attending the automobile races. The front car turned over and the riotorman's vestibule was torn off and thrown against the side of a building several feet away. The colli-sion snapped the coupling between the head car and the trailer, resulting in the trailer failing to turn over. Both cars were loaded to capacity.

The traction line is on the main street nere, and the accident occurred almost in the heart of the city. A physician's office near the place where the accident occurred was converted into an emerency hospital, where the injured were aken for medical attention. All avail-ble physicians were rushed to the place.
