CHILD OF RAILWAY PRESIDENT ENDED MISERABLE CAREER

Found Dead At Hotel Where She Had Registered With Chauffeur As Wife.

DRUNKEN DRUG ADDICT

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Detectives are searching for Robert Potter, a chauffeur whose address they do not know, in the hope of clearing up the exact cause of the death of a woman whom they believe to have been a former Baltimore society girl, and whose life was a sordid and lonely one. The woman, of whose body an autopsy will be performed to determine whether the medical examiner's office is right in its belief that drink and drugs killed her, was in the opinion of the police, Sarah Camillea Cowen, 32 years old, daughter of the late John K. Cowen, one time president of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

The woman, who was married to a retired New Haven capitalist, whom she divorced in Washington State two years later on the ground of desertion, and the woman went together to the Hotel Maryland in West Forty-ninth street on Saturday night, and registered as a married couple. SAMPLE OF PUBLIC SPIRITEDNESS SHOWN BY LONDON WOMAN

Following publication of the fact that permanent playgrounds for the children of West London are not at present, owing to the fact that property in this section of the city suitable for recreational centres, is owned by citizens who demand exorbitant prices for their land, a London woman has written to the Mayor, Mr. E. AWARDED \$375 DAMAGES.—In the action of Roberts vs. Wilkinson, which was tried before Judge Abbott Macbeth in the county court several weeks ago, the judge has awarded the plaintiff \$375 damages. On July 16 he pointed out that "if any view of the contract was correct, there was no breach of contract, and there was no assessment of damages for the defendant's breach of that contract, and I thereupon stated that I would allow the plaintiff to give evidence of such damages as he might be entitled to, and I refused the assessment for damages. Accordingly on July 30 the judge made the award. The plaintiff was suing for damages for breach of contract."

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CITY MERCHANTS' GEORGE ORDERS FOR SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Orders Given For 50,000 Work Books and Other Necessaries.

T. A. Tanner, secretary of the board of education, announced today that all orders for supplies for London's public schools to be utilized during the ensuing year, have been placed. A feature of this announcement is that all orders have been placed in London, local merchants and publishers obtaining this trade.

However, some of these merchants will be compelled to purchase supplies, such as maps, which are not manufactured here, but will obtain a legitimate profit on such transactions. It is pointed out that such supplies retail here just as cheaply as the manufacturer will quote to the school board.

Included in the orders are details for 20,000 work books or unruled scribbles, and 20,000 ruled exercise books, which are being bound by local publishers, who manufacture them. While the low cost of these books is a factor in awarding the contracts, as did also payment of freight from outside points, which increased the cost, assisting local merchants to obtain the orders.

LONDON LABOR MEN WILL NOT TAKE PART IN TORONTO MEETING

Unemployment Insurance Is Favored by Local Workers, It Is Claimed.

Arthur Mould, chairman of a committee of the trades and labor council, recently selected to discuss unemployment issues, intimated to The Advertiser yesterday that as far as he was aware at that time the committee would not be represented at the general meeting of the Unemployed Association of Canada, called for Monday next in Toronto. The chairman advises that his committee has met for three weeks or more, and unless the members decide to participate he will take no steps in the matter. Although he says he may be in Toronto on that date it will be purely in an unofficial capacity.

The headquarters of the unemployed organization in Toronto announces that an appeal will be made to have the various trades unions of the province and the different returned soldiers' bodies send their delegates. "Work or Unemployment Insurance" has been adopted as the slogan to impress the Dominion Government with the general situation regarding the unemployed.

"Have heard nothing of it," commented a member of the local G. W. V. A. executive. "Although the majority of the unemployed are in favor of unemployment insurance, I am sure that we will not be represented at this gathering." Maxwell Armstrong, whom it is stated is very active in Toronto in the furthering of this movement, is said to be well-known by a certain branch of labor workers.

Although some time ago, Hon. Mr. Robertson, Dominion minister of labor, gave as his opinion that a considerable length of time would be required, possibly two years, to introduce unemployment insurance like that of the United Kingdom, with any degree of success, some of the local labor men insist that such could practically be accomplished over night.

WILL NOT INTERFERE WITH SHEEP PEN SITE

Board of Health Does Not Consider Short Period a Nuisance.

Despite the fact that property owners of East London, residing adjacent to the sheep pen, have registered objections to sheep pens being maintained near the southwest angle of the park during Western Fair week, the Board of Health, and city council will take no action to restrict the operation of these pens.

The reason for such action in regard to what the complainants designate a public nuisance, is the fact that the sheep pen will only be in operation for a period of one week, and that the occupants will be of interest to thousands of visitors to the fair, while only a few if any citizens will be inconvenienced.

"It could be a shame to deprive visitors from the country an opportunity to view prize sheep," said A. G. B. Drake, who is also a member of the Board of Health. "The sheep will only be there for a short time, and I do not think they will constitute a nuisance. The smell of sheep pens is healthy."

TWO RIBS BROKEN WHEN RIDER WAS KNOCKED OFF BIKE.

Ernest Rider Struck by Auto Driven by Gordon Calhoun.

Knocked off his bicycle when he was struck by an automobile about 10 a.m. today, Ernest Rider, 835 Lorne avenue, suffered the fracture of two ribs as well as some minor injuries.

The accident occurred at the corner of Queen's avenue and Wellington street. The motorist, driven by Gordon Calhoun, was making the turn on to Wellington street when the collision took place with Mr. Rider, who was approaching from the south. A physician, called in and following a hasty examination, the stricken man was hurried home in the police ambulance.

SOLDIERS' AID WORK IS NOT YET FINISHED

Average of 33 Men a Day Are Given Assistance or Advice.

VETERANS' DEPENDENTS Boys and Girls of Heroic Dead Are Cared For.

Preliminary figures compiled by the local branch of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, showing what use has been made, by the returned men, of the organization, were obtained in view of a story published in a local paper recently that orders were not received to cut the staff of the local branch thereby reducing the work correspondingly and probably close the branch within one year. One of the local officials denied to-day that there was any intention to close the work of the commission entirely.

He said, "While it is true that we have orders to curtail our work to some extent and to reduce our staff, the local executive consider the work has developed to such a great extent and has assumed so much importance among the returned men of London and district that it cannot be rendered inefficient at this time."

Over 35,000 Veterans. According to the figures obtained, over thirty-eight thousand returned soldiers have made use of the office, either calling in person or writing in for the assistance required. Since the local branch was constituted, in August 1, 1916, this number does not include the large number of dependents who have found the Soldiers' Aid a real "AID" when they found themselves in need of assistance or advice.

To give some concrete idea of the growth and continued use of the commission by the returned men, the past four years' figures are given as follows: For the year ending July 31, 1918, 4,246 men used the office; 1919, 7,722; 1920, 12,400; 1921, 12,654. It will be seen that although there was a slight reduction for the past year as compared to 1920, the number recorded proves beyond question that the service rendered the returned men is of great value. The figures also show that the local officials for the energy with which the work has been carried on.

From a close study of the monthly reports of the local commission, it is readily seen that the work has been gradually changing during the past year from work for the returned man to work for their dependents. The welfare of the dependents has become a more important factor in the work of the commission, and in doing so has earned the respect and cooperation of all organizations doing social service work in the city. This has been the result of the fact that the local commission, which has on several occasions appropriated large sums of money to be spent under the direction of the commission's welfare workers in the needy families of veterans in the city.

Thirty-Three Soldiers a Day. During the year just closed the largest number of men making use of the commission's office was in the month of December, when 1,218 were registered. For the month of July last the number was 87, or an average of 33 each day for the month.

Since last October the local branch has carried on its work among the soldiers' children, thus adding a new department and one that has a tremendous opportunity for the energies that has received the unequalled approval of returned men in general. Although the employment department was closed a few months ago, this new department practically takes its place.

"Aid, Frank E. Harley of the local commission and his colleagues are to be commended for the excellent work that has been done here to help in reinstating the returned men to civil life, and in continuing to help them socially," said a member of the local business community today, "and I trust that this splendid organization, which has been built up for the good of London and citizens of London, will not be broken up at this critical time."

ABANDONED CAR AND TEN EMPTY WHISKEY BOTTLES FOUND HERE

Auto With License Number 101-218 Discovered On Hamilton Road.

Police are seeking the owner of an auto bearing Ontario license No. 101-218, which was abandoned by two men at a bridge on the Hamilton road just east of the city last night. A tourist going to Toronto informed Police Constable Louis MacCaughy early this morning that the car had been left there.

In company with Sergeant Elmer Walsh and Constable Percy Last, the officer went to the scene and found the car, but three tires and a battery had been stolen. It is a large car, and ten empty whiskey bottles were strewn around. One bottle filled with port wine was also found on the ground.

EXPECT WORK ON WINDSOR HOSPITAL TO BEGIN THIS MONTH

Some few matters remain to be adjusted regarding the additional building to the new Salvation Army Grace Hospital, Windsor, but these will be attended to in the course of a few days and the contract will be let at the earliest possible moment. It is expected that work on the new structure will be well under way before the end of August.

It is expected that \$175,000 will be raised for this purpose, of which the Windsor council have already granted \$50,000; \$10,000 has been raised by popular subscription, \$25,000 of this amount already being paid in, and the remaining \$75,000 to be paid within a short time. Many of these donations were large sums, several of them being for \$10,000 each.

When completed this hospital will be the largest in the territory west of London.

KIWANIANS GIVE 50 INVALIDS A COUNTRY OUTING

Patients of Westminster Hospital Enjoy Auto Trip and Picnic.

Thirty automobiles, belonging to members of the Kiwanis Club, under direction of Wilfred Hodgins, left his garage last night at 8:30 and proceeded to Westminster Hospital where they took on board 150 patients for a motor trip. The party left the hospital at 7 o'clock, and returned at 9:30 p.m.

Coming into the city at Ridout street, they drove to Dundas, to Waterloo, to St. Joseph's Hospital, down to Oxford street and out to Hyde Park. Returning to Springbank a stop was made at the Park zoo and after looking over the animals the party drove to Kiwanis E. Moore's fruit farm where the boys were treated to watermelon, ice cream, bananas, soft drinks and various other delicacies. After lunch the patients were engaged in singing songs and otherwise thoroughly enjoying themselves.

This was the first trip of the kind given to the patients of this hospital, and in expressing their appreciation of the spirit which prompted the kindly act of the Kiwanians, also intimated that in their opinion if more entertainments of the kind could be given to the patients it would in a large number of cases lead to quicker recoveries.

Salvation Army Plans Erection of Cottage Homes On Estate.

Col. A. The present structure will be practically be remodelled from carpet to basement, and the bricks will be covered with stucco.

At the present building will only accommodate 30 children, as soon as the renovation is completed several cottages will be erected on the grounds which the Salvation Army own in the same block. It is understood that six cottages will be erected, four of which, capable of accommodating twelve children each, and the other two being set aside for the children to play in on rainy days. The dining room will remain in its main building, and the houses will all be linked together so that the children will not have to go outside to pass from one to the other.
