CHINESE FACE CRISIS AS DEBT GROWS RAPIDLY

Finance Minister Beset With Worries and Cabinet Embarrassed.

TUNG CAUSES TROUBLE

PEKING, July 17.—China two weeks ago apparently was nearing reunification.

Its leaders had agreed upon a common course of action for the good of the country, but today it seems to be moving toward a crisis. The ministry of finance faces a daily crisis with its increasing debts, keeping the minister and cabinet in a constant state of embarrassment.

Among other claims are those of American firms who have liens on the railway rolling stock and locomotives, the collection of which, it is pointed out, is virtually impossible at present.

Refuse Resignation.
President Li Yuan Hung is striving to hold the cabinet together until parliament meets. The resignation of the cabinet, offered following a gloomy meeting yesterday, was refused by the president, who urged Dr. Yen to hold over until August.

The resignation crisis was brought on by Tung Kang, whose drastic work in the ministry of finance brought down wholesale criticism and who caused the first libel suit in the history of China. Tung is suing a Chinese vernacular paper for alleged libelous statements.

Semi-official sources, admitting the offered resignation, claim it was only a formal offer made to give the president a chance to reorganize the ministry if he wished, neither Dr. Yen nor the ministers having an idea of going out.

Cabinet Will Hold.
It generally is believed the cabinet will hold over until August.

Meantime Chang Tso Lin has been strengthened morally by the arrival of two delegates sent from Peking to discuss the Manchurian war lord's plan. He has assumed a surly attitude toward Peking and is being strengthened each day by new soldiers and followers.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen's refusal to come to terms with Peking has caused Wu Pei-fu and Feng Yuh Siang to withdraw troops for the beginning of a southern campaign in a final effort to defeat the southern leader.

RAILMEN TO CAST STRIKE BALLOTS

Stratford Shopmen and Machinists Meet To Discuss Situation.

STRATFORD, July 17.—Up to this afternoon J. J. Dalrymple, of the local Federated Shop Crafts, had received no word from headquarters regarding the situation created by the break down of wage negotiations at Montreal.

The notice of the proposed reduced scale, operative today, was posted in the shops Friday.

Mr. Dalrymple states that a meeting of the men will be held some time this week to consider the situation. Strike ballots, which are being distributed in other railway centers, are thought to be already in the city.

The local machinists at their regular meeting tonight, discussed the situation. During a severe storm this afternoon, lightning struck the residence of Mrs. (Dr.) Hamilton, but no damage was done.

A very encouraging report of the business of the Hydro Shop was presented to the public utilities commission this morning. It is expected that over \$100,000 of business will be transacted this year.

Judgment has been given by Judge Barron in favor of Mrs. Flora Hurst for \$532.25 and full costs, against Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Stevens. The plaintiff purchased the property and furniture of the American House and claimed that the condition of the contents of the house were not as represented.

M. C. McPhail, district representative of agriculture, stated today that serious damage to Perth oat crop was being done by rust.

Affected presumably by the heat, Charles Vere, a local postman, fell unconscious while sorting mail at the postoffice this morning. He did not recover consciousness until late this afternoon.

Sixty-six members of the Glaab family were here yesterday for a family reunion at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Glaab. Among those present were: Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Glaab, Mr. and Mrs. James Glaab, Woodstock, and Wilfred Glaab, Guelph.

At the age of 78, Daniel Reider is dead here. He was born in North Easthope and came here ten years ago. Besides his wife, he is survived by Charles Reider, Stratford; Milton, Shakespeare.

2 DETROIT MEN SHOT TO DEATH

DETROIT, July 17.—Two more killings in Detroit's down-river district were laid today by the police to rum-runners. The victims, Robert D. Cochran, an automobile salesman, and Neal Doherty, a railroad worker, motoring on Emmons Boulevard, Lincoln Park, were overtaken by the occupants of another automobile and riddled with bullets. Cochran received 22 bullets, while 18 entered Doherty's body.
