

EAST HIGH PLANS NEAR COMPLETION

Board To Engage Additional Architect To Speed Up Work.

Working plans of London's new east collegiate institute will be complete within the next two weeks. So eager is the board of education to commence construction that a special session of the building committee yesterday decided to secure a provisional assistant for architect L. E. Carrothers.

Chairman S. F. Lawerson was authorized to approach a local architect and engage him to speed up the work. Mr. Carrothers told the committee that, without assistance, he could not complete plans in less than three weeks. There is a chance that the board may also need a consultant later on.

Details of construction of the proposed school are being carefully considered before being passed upon. There appears to be a general antipathy towards "frills," and, at the same time, there is a desire to construct an attractive building. Modifications of Tudor and Gothic architecture were discussed with some freedom last night. A battle-ment front, windows with rounded tops, entrances set out from the main walls and other modes of securing relief from strict lines are suggested. During its two-hour session last night the building committee discussed library, lunchroom, assembly hall, ventilation and other matters. The committee will hold a special meeting on Friday afternoon to clear up further detail.

Bombay, Aug. 1.—A contingent of 700 Indian lascars, the first to be recruited here to replace the striking British overseas sailors, left today for South Africa.

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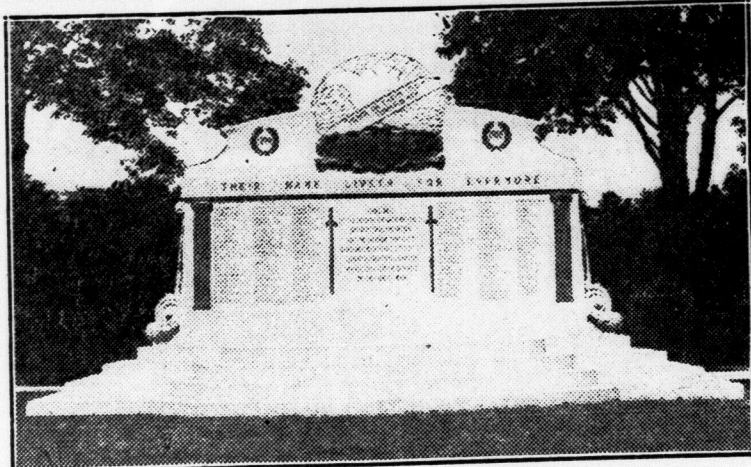
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WOODSTOCK WAR MEMORIAL.

CAPITOL THEATRE.

The Street of Forgotten Men.

The Street of Forgotten Men, the feature picture for the first half of this week at the Capitol Theatre, is one of the strongest pictures which London has seen for months. Not only is the action good, but the setting and costuming, dating back to the days of horse cars in New York, is wonderfully well done.

The story centers about the actions of a clique of professional beggars and make-up men, who are cripples and blind when at work, but remarkably active and alert when at leisure. Even among this type there are some worse than others, and the Street of Forgotten Men is a thrilling story of the life of one of these "better" frauds, who became wealthy at his calling. He is left with a pretty ward, whom he raises and who eventually marries a millionaire.

To those who enjoy a picture ranging from the slightly comic to the deepest pathos, this feature will appeal as few recent ones have done. Percy Montfort, who plays the lead, is a wonderful cripple, and the peep behind the scenes to watch him "make up" with a dummy arm cut off at the elbow is almost startling in itself. Mary Brian, who takes the part of his ward, is equally good. The whole play is good, in fact, absolutely clever. "Soup to Nuts," comedy relief to offset the very moving drama which precedes it, is just what one requires to lighten the program. It is a screaming run of Pathe news film rounds out a very satisfying program, one seldom excelled even in these days of super pictures.

PROSPECTORS DISCOVER GOLD NEAR TASHOTU

Numerous Claims Staked When Gold-Bearing Quartz Found.

President Solares has requested the resignation of General Alfredo Rivas, who is in charge of the fortress and garrison in Managua, in order to avoid a repetition of dictation to the president by military officials.

Tires, Bolts, Rims, Spark Plugs Loot For Thieves In Farm Raid

Ingersoll, Aug. 31.—An automobile belonging to Roy Harris of Dereham township, near Verschoyle, was stripped of four tires, together with the rims of the wheels, by thieves who entered his home Sunday night. Bolts were also taken from the wheels, as well as spark plugs from the engine. It was evident that the thieves had endeavored to carry off the spare tire, but they were either disturbed or experienced difficulty.

CUSTOMS SHOW TRADE HEALTHY

Monthly Report Indicates Londoners Are Patronizing Home Industries.

A healthy trend is evident in the customs and excise duties collected in London district for the month of August. That we are importing less and buying more from home industries is proven by the decrease in import taxes collected. In August, 1924, such duties totalled \$105,171.20, in August, 1925, \$97,575.58, a decrease of \$7,595.62.

An abnormal increase in the amount of sales tax collected is the other feature of the report. This gain amounted to \$79,527.27. In August, 1924, but \$73,341.02 was collected from this tax, last month the total was \$122,868.29. This more than disproves the oft-repeated assertion that less buying is being done in the district.

A slight decrease of \$5,091.75 is noted in the amount of excise taxes collected. The totals for the month are: customs, \$115,622.62; excise, \$174,933.99; income tax, \$49,267.78; a grand total of \$339,764.78.

UNITED PARTY IDEA BEGUN BY CRERAR

Plan To Unite Liberals and Progressives in West Well Supported.

Winnipeg, Aug. 31.—The Tribune carried the following in its news page today: "Inspiration for the attempt to launch a 'western party' as an amalgamation of the Liberals and Progressives came from Hon. T. A. Crerar, Saskatchewan Progressive leader."

"There has been lively curiosity throughout the west over the source of the political articles the Saskatchewan Star has been running. These articles constitute an attempt to line up the Liberals and Progressives in a solid western party to demand western rights. . . . The source has been disclosed."

"Mr. Crerar, Hon. A. C. Dunning, Hon. A. B. Hudson, J. Fred Johnson, M.P., and there is reason to believe, Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King himself, support the idea. . . ."

"Mr. Crerar first sought to give birth to the new party at the provincial Progressive convention held at Regina recently. This meeting was closed to the press, and the statements that were given out apparently concealed more than they revealed."

"Nothing at all was said about Mr. Crerar's speech. . . . It was an ardent plea for a union of the Liberal and Progressive forces of the west, with the object of making certain, if possible, the defeat of speech."

"The colorful idea Mr. Crerar laid before the convention was to have Dunning and Hon. Herbert Greenfield, premier of the new prairie province, call a convention to which all Liberals and Progressives would send delegates. At this convention the idea blossomed out next in the columns of the Saskatchewan Star. . . . The articles in the Star," said a leading member of the Progressive organization here today, "have been almost a paraphrase of Mr. Crerar's speech. . . ."

"Mr. Dunning, head of the Saskatchewan government, recently visited Mr. King at Ottawa and conferred with him at length. He also conferred in Winnipeg at least so Saskatchewan Progressives have been informed—with Mr. Crerar and Mr. Hudson. They say, need be sought no further."

The article continues by quoting R. M. Johnson, of Moose Jaw, a former Progressive organizer of Saskatchewan, as stating he opposed the idea of the convention, and that generally it did not receive support.

ORANGE LEADER DENIES ATTACKS ON BIDWELL

Dr. Edwards States Bishop Must Have Been Misquoted in Statements.

Kingston, Aug. 31.—Referring to a despatch which appeared in a number of Canadian papers on Saturday, quoting Bishop Bidwell, of Ontario, as answering in the affirmative the question, if the Orangemen were waging war against him, Dr. Edwards, grand master of the Orange order, said in a interview in The Standard that Bishop Bidwell must surely have been misquoted.

"The fact is," said Dr. Edwards, "Orangemen have not concerned themselves in any way with Bishop Bidwell's affairs, have never thought of waging war against him, and have no desire to add to his difficulties the slightest degree, but indeed have a profound sympathy for him in his troubles."

PORT CREW SCOW OWNER MUST REMOVE VESSEL
Toronto, Aug. 31.—A scow anchored off a gully on the Lake Erie shore at Port Credit, sixty miles from Windsor, must be removed, according to an order made by Mr. Justice Logie at Osgoode Hall this morning, so that N. Hushon, owning the adjoining farm, may have access to the beach.

The order was made in an action brought by Crewe Bros., fishermen, against Hushon and others, restraining the defendants from cutting the mooring of the scow which the farmers contended interfered with their hauling of gravel. The trial is set for September 21.
