## Down the Line In All Sports OTTAWA SHOT WON

The official handbook of the A. A. U. of C. in paragraph 2, section 9 of its general rules for the athletic meetings and competitions says:

"An athlete who fails to compete after entering an event in a bona fide way and according to rules shall be required to furnish a satisfactory explanation for so doing or render himself liable to censure or suspension by the local registration committee."

If Secretary A. T. Taylor and the whole of the local committee are to suspended it looks as if the athletes who were so unsporting as to withdraw should be dealt with with as much despatch.

The athletes who withdrew had recourse to protest, and at no time were they threatened by the Ontario branch officials with suspension if

"The Ontario branch of the A. A. U. of Canada intends that Ontario athletic championships shall be won by Ontario athletes. This is the correct stand to take. The rules are plain; all competing athletes must be resident of a branch for at least two months prior to the holding of a championship meet. The whole thing is a most unfortunate affair, as the championship meet was intended to stimulate interest in athletics in that part of the province, but as it turns out the contrary is the result."
