

# London Blanks Glencoe :- Sarnia Victorious In Half Hour Overtime

## GLENCOE INTERMEDIATES GO UNDER TO LONDON, 5-0

Scotchmen Find Locals' Speed Too Much in Last Two Periods.

Sarnia Rally Wins in Third Ten-Minute Overtime Session.

London Intermediates defeated Arthur Davenport's Glencoe villagers, 5-0, before a fair crowd at the arena last night, thus taking a harder grip on the top rung of the group ladder. London was held to 1-0 in the first period and to 3-0 by the end of the second and then ran in two in the last canto, both tallies coming from Art Gillies' stick on combination, the key to which the Londoners found at last in the second period and which may make the team line a real scoring machine from now on.

The first period was orthodox hockey—slow, splashy and leaving the fans indifferent—but the last two were crammed full of action and strenuous play, and had the pewholders pop-eyed and massaging each other with excited elbows. Both teams started, carrying their sticks high, and the second chapter was a parade of offenders who will have callouses on their shoulders before the season is out unless they keep their sticks closer to the ice. It was a great display of the art of the sly cross check, the still sly butt end and the stiff butt, none too scientific body check. Sandercock got a lot of them, but there were a lot of the feud outbreaks that got by.

**Quick Good.** London should have scored a dozen more goals, but for the unusually good goalkeeping of Quick all through the game. In the first period they swept down continually in one effort without any effort to combine and right on top of goal. Davenport, the former London star, hooked a good many of the rushes to a stop with his little stick and did not rush on his own account—quick spurts with nimble twists and turns through the whole London team, and his partner in crime, Willis, also relieved the pressure when the strong arm work of the Glencoe mid-ice men let the Londoners get by.

Not a tick happened in the way of a goal until 16 minutes of this sort of hockey had gone on until Quick in a melee tried to go after a rebound, and McGeehook hooked it away and slapped in the first counter. The second period put the game into the cyclonic gear, and it was one twenty-minute scramble with flashes of really brilliant play. No less than eight passes to the house-gang to listen to the seconds to their tolling. Gillies and Burgess combined several times, and drove some hot ones at the goal. McGeehook was sandwiched out of one solo effort. Hindmarsh, on for a few moments, showed the best form he has yet, with several good blocks and abbreviated rushes. Somers, Burgess and McGeehook shunted down and missed an open goal, and Davenport wormed his way the length of the ice, driving forward Smith, who sprawled out to check him.

**A Liner.** A lift from center by Affeck nearly fooled Smith as it curved from the roof, before Gillies and Doolittle combined for a two-man attack right into the Glencoe goal. The goal was so fast that Aldred and Greer handed each other a double K.O. with a nose-on collision in trying to stop Somers in a rush. Gillies, in a balance act with his stick, swished.

Garrison Boxing Committee Has Already Signed Sixteen Topnotchers.

CY POOK TO APPEAR

Chairman Burns of the London Garrison boxing committee has just about completed his card for the big boxing show to be staged in the armories Friday, Jan. 25. He has spared no efforts in combining the province for the very best talent, and his efforts have been rewarded by signing up around sixteen of the foremost amateur boxers in Ontario and is waiting confirmation from four other headliners.

The feature bout will be between Cy Pook of St. Thomas and Charles McDougal of Toronto. Pook holds the Canadian light heavyweight crown, while McDougal is the Ontario heavy and light heavyweight champion.

In the middleweight class William Gumb, a newcomer in London, is slated to meet Lazenby of St. Thomas. "Buzz" Moore coming.

Dave Smith, the local boy, who has already been seen in many good bouts in the local ring, is matched against "Buzz" Moore of Hamilton, who is reputed to be the most popular boxer in the Ambitious City.

The Royal Canadian Regiment has completed arrangements to bring Pte. Furniss of "B" Company, Toronto. He will be seen in action here against Pete Laing, the aggressive St. Thomas featherweight.

"Smiler" Gardiner of St. Thomas, bantam, will meet B. Woodham, the best boy in his weight in Tommy Wallace's Boxing Academy.

**Murrell Meets Hickling.** One of the best bouts seen in a local ring last year was that between the two local flyweights, Curd Murrell and Hickling. This was the only time these two ever met, and while Murrell won the decision, Hickling has been angling for a return bout for the last year. Chairman Harry Burns has been convinced that Hickling is now in shape and he has decided to get them together on the 25th.

## SPRING MAY SEE DISTRICT CENTER OF SOCCER WAR

Think A. A. U. of C. in Control Would Mean Canadianization of Game.

CITY TOUCHED DIRECTLY

The breach in Canadian soccer is apparently beyond the healing stage. The Canadian Football Association, formed of the "rebel" Toronto and Hamilton clubs expelled from the Ontario Football Association, has been successful in securing affiliation with the A. A. U. of C. through the Ontario branch, and has turned a cold shoulder to all advances made by the Dominion Football Association, the parent governing body of soccer in Canada.

The Dominion Football Association also is seeking affiliation with the A. A. U. of C. and, unofficially, at least, asking for power to conduct its own affairs.

**In Awkward Position.** This puts the A. A. U. of C. in an awkward position, but if it puts soccer in its hands, many people profess to believe it will be the ultimate good of the game, and will mean its eventual Canadianization.

London is touched directly by the soccer war when the rumor is broadcasted that the Canadian Football Association will carry the war into the Ontario Football Association's domain by raiding Western Ontario.

London has been in the Ontario Football Association as a district association since 1919. During that time the iron hand of the provincial body felt lightly enough on the London and District F. A. Whether the new Canadian Association would be made to put soccer here is doubtful. It has only ten rebel clubs as a nucleus for next season, and what inducement it could offer district associations are not apparent at the present time.

The London and District Football Association will hold its annual meeting shortly, at which a serious attempt will be made to put soccer on a more stable basis hereabouts. It is possible that the aspirations of the Canadian Football Association will be disclosed at this meeting.

## WILL STAGE INDOOR GAMES ON THURSDAY

R. C. R.'s Meet C. O. T. C. and Gunners Play Battery This Week.

While it appeared the latter part of last week as if the armories would be a total loss as far as indoor sports were concerned, and, therefore, the whole indoor program for London this winter be left in the debris, it appears that while nights are available have been greatly curtailed, there will be a few Saturday nights left.
