

From the London Mail. An extraordinary fact, which is calcul-

ated to cause a stir in bontanical circles, has been observed by Col. Thompson during the past two years, and is now made public for the first time. A little plant public for the first time. A little plant called pllea microphylla has constantly come up in the pots in which jadoo fibre has been used, and as this plant is a native of the West Indies and tropical America, it is clear that it comes from the moss, which is obtained solely from Yorkshice, and, which is used on the preparation of jadoo, though in this climate the pilea can-not be grown in the open air. The surmise of the Colonel is that the seed was deposited in the moss countless

The surmise of the Colonel is that the seed was deposited in the moss countless ages ago, when a tropical elimate prevailed here, similar to what it was in the mid-eocene period, when the ceitis or nettic eocene from the bread fruits and the giant cacti flourished in Britain. 
