FIRST MEETING OF NEW TOWN COUNCIL

Town Officials Appointed and
Other Business Transacted
Tuesday Evening

The first meeting of the newly elected town council was held in the town offices Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. His Honor Judge McLatchey by request was present and administered the oath of office to the following councillors:—Chas. A. Alexander, Wm. H. Miller, John Harquail, Jas. S. Evans, John Quinn and David Champoux. Councillors McBeath and Patterson were not present both being out of town.

His Worship Mayor Andrew thanked His Honor for his kindness in being present to administer the oath to the councillors.

The council was then called to order. The minutes of two previous meetings were read and approved.

The clerk then read the results of Nomination and Election.

Coun. Harquail moved that a committee of three be named to draft standing committees—Carried.

His Worship named Couns Miller, Evans and Alexander such committee.

The council took recess while the committee prepared their report.

In the past three weeks numerous requests have been sent in to the Agricultural Department, Fredericton, for seed wheat but unfortunately through the oversight of the former government in not making application for such seed last December, it is impossible to procure a bushel from the usual source of supply.

This is indeed very unfortunate as many farmers who had not heretofore planted wheat had decided to try it this season, owing to the extremely high cost of flour.

If any of our readers know where seed wheat can be procured, or if they have any for sale we wish they would write us at once.

The Department of Agriculture will, however, be able to supply barley to any one who makes application to the Department at Fredericton.

GAVE HIS LIFE FOR HIS COUNTRY

Judson P. Nelson Reported Killed
in Action—Was Member
Of 132nd.

Word was received here Sunday morning that Corp. Judson P. Nelson son of Mrs. Robt. Nelson had been killed in action in France April 9th. He was 21 years of age, Jud, as he was called, was the youngest of the family and the news of his death on the field of glory has cast a gloom over all.

Previous to enlisting he worked at the McLennan Foundry and Machine Works, and out of respect to his memory the flag at the Works was at half mast Monday.

In December 1915 he enlisted with the 132nd but in England he was drafted to a Montreal Battalion.

The family have the heartfelt sympathy of all in their bereavement.

When the matter of appointment of assessors came up Coun. Harquail objected to the Town Clerk being appointed. Three assessors are called for and these are supposed to view the different properties and agree upon a valuation. If they disagree, the majority rules. When Mr. Reid is appointed he does not go about viewing the different properties and therefore a proper valuation was not made.

His Worship explained that under the old system three assessors were appointed. These went about town viewing the different properties and fixing a value thereon. They carried little memo books, and no perma record was kept. About four years ago a new system was adopted and the keeping of the system left with the Town Clerk, who was appointed an assessor. By this system every piece of property is entered separately so that a ratepayer can ascertain just what each lot is valued at and what taxes are assessed against each. With the present system it was not necessary for the assessors to go about viewing each property, but in a half a day they could drive about town, view the new and improved properties and in three or four days make a good assessment.

Couns. Miller and Alexander spoke strongly in favor of the system as worked out in the past few years.

Coun. Harquail moved that the appointment of assessors be laid over until the next meeting—Carried.

Coun. Harquail, when the appointment of the building inspector came up said he thought the Town Engineer who had some technical knowledge of old matters should be appointed. Also citizens were remarking that the Town Engineer did not seem to be very busy and no doubt had plenty of time to undertake these additional duties. He moved that R. J. Sandover Sly be appointed Building Inspector—Carried.

The attention of the Council was called to the unsightly overturned building at the corner of the Subway and Coun. Miller said this matter was being remedied.

Coun. Harquail spoke of the shortage of copies of the Town Bylaws and moved that the Town Clerk be asked to procure prices on 100 and 500 copies—Carried.

The Council then adjourned.
