"Had there been a strong wind blowing that day I would not have given that piece of paper for that part of King-street. Next year I am going to ask that a new and large hall be erected in the centre of the city where I can keep my heavy material. As it is now by the time the hook and ladders reach a fire the hose is often laid and the way blocked."

Chairman Bell said there were hydrants that were not used once in 10 years and yet they had to be paid for. "Why, do you know there are hydrants on streets upon which there are no houses, and hydrants are put down without our being consulted."

The motion prevailed, Ald. William Carlyle promising to do his best to secure its acceptance by the Waterworks Committee.

Fireman Robert Foster was granted a three months' leave of absence owing to illhealth.
