THE DEBATING MAIL

What the Outside Press Think of its Last Move—Every Kind of Price for All Kinds of People.

From the Stratford Herald, Conservative. The Toronto News, which is understood to be owned by the same people who control the Mail and Empire, has made the peculiar announcement that the Mail and Empire are shortly to be placed in the hands of the Toronto reading public for one cent a copy.

It is a question whether the Mail and Empire's success would be in the interest of the conservative party. At present the Mail and Empire is following faithfully the line of the party traces, but were it to be sold to the Toronto reading public, it would be a different matter.

St. Thomas Journal (Liberal). The Toronto News announced the other evening that the Mail and Empire would soon be offered as a one-cent paper. This would be a death-blow to the Toronto News, as it is not prepared to die without a struggle, and it is a humiliating thing for a newspaper to be sold for one cent.

At the annual meeting of No. 4 Ward Four Conservative Association, held in Ward Four Hall last night, Col. F. C. Denison, M.P., addressed his constituents. He approved of the government's action in having a second session.

The secretary-treasurer's report showed 250 names on the roll and a slight increase for the year. The finances are in a satisfactory state. The officers were elected: President, Miles Yokes; first vice-president, J. N. Brown; second vice-president, Pritchard; J. N. McKendry, John McCaffrey and S. W. Burns; secretary-treasurer, F. J. O'Brien; and executive committee, S. A. Jones, G. W. Smith, James Mitchell, A. D. Hubbard, Fred Dane and Alexander Purse; auditor, R. W. Riddle, re-elected.

The Local Board of Health meets today when Dr. Sheard will report that the increase of typhoid in Canada, due to the rising of the conduit, but as there was an average of 35 cases per month in January, February and March on the occasion of the former break, the results have not been as disastrous as anticipated.

The Journal of Commerce and Commercial Bulletin will say to-morrow that the fire loss of the United States and Canada for the month of October shows a total of \$13,110,000 over \$5,000,000 more than the same chargeable against October, 1894. The 1895 fire loss to date about \$4,000,000 greater than the total for the same period of 1894.

The Court of Revision yesterday devoted its time to confirming property assessments in Ward 6. The general assessments were fixed at between \$30 and \$35. In the neighborhood of the Mercer Reformatory about 10 per cent. The assessments in this district were very low, ranging from \$5 to \$10 in side streets.

COMMERCIAL NEWS

The earnings of Canadian Pacific last month were the largest on record being \$1,000,000, or 10 per cent. over the corresponding period of 1894. Prospects were never better, owing to the large quantity of wheat yet to be shipped eastward. The stock market, however, continues weak in sympathy with the decline in all railroad prospects.

The shorts in Toronto Street Railway stock are covering and therefore, no support comes from that interest. A good deal of stock was offered yesterday, the largest portion by a broker identified with one of the leading directors of the company, and the stock broke 2 per cent., closing at 77 1/2. The net earnings of the road for the past 10 months show an increase of hardly \$3,000 over the corresponding period of last year. This is not up to expectations.

Gold exports are again talked of in Wall-street, which somewhat aggravates the unsettled financial situation. Well-known financiers admit that it is very difficult to make a prediction regarding a renewal of gold shipments, although there is little likelihood of postponing them. The principal means for any length of time.

The exports of Canadian produce for the first three months of the fiscal year are valued at \$22,481,642, as compared with \$18,222,000 for the corresponding quarter of last year.

The losses of insurance companies through fire waste have been smaller this year to date than last, but the market is heavy, and they will make serious inroads into the profits of the companies for the current year.

Cables report dull and weaker wheat markets in the United States and Canada, which were very dull on Monday, are likely to be weak this morning. The amount of wheat in sight continues to pile up, the aggregate on passage to Europe and in warehouses in America being 75,000 bushels, an increase of 3,144,000 bushels for the week. A year ago, however, the total was 107,015,000 bushels.

In the face of the weakness and the low prices in the United States and Canada, prices at Ontario points rule firm. Farmers should take advantage of the low price of wheat, but it is the difficult to comprehend. Since the amalgamation of the Mail and Empire, the conservative field, so far as organization is concerned, more completely to itself than has been the case since the Empire was established. Can there be any truth in the horrible suspicion that the Mail is merely an annex to a paper mill, and not the independent and conscientious exponent of conservative principles?

At the fire incident held at Aurora last August a verdict was brought in to the effect that a certain quantity of the Mail and Empire, owned by the Evening News, owned by the same proprietor as the Mail and Empire, was destroyed by fire, was not in the freight sheds when the fire occurred. At the sessions held here last September the Graham brothers were held before the grand jury on a conspiracy to defraud the insurance company out of \$1000 or thereabouts, but the trial has not taken place. In order to force the matter to a conclusion as speedily as possible, the Graham brothers have been arrested. Messrs.
