Many excellent articles have been written on "Why the boys leave the farm," but if the boy could clearly see a clean fighting chance towards independence ahead of him, many of their "whys" would cease to exist. What is the general age of the boy when he decides to leave for the city? It is the high school age, when the idea of a commercial life first takes hold of the imagination. He cannot sympathize with the idea of getting up at half past four in the morning and retiring at ten o'clock at night, because the interests of the farm home are not his, and he naturally has no particular interest in the care of the crops. He studies at the high school subjects out of harmony with his life on the farm. Ancient history, languages and higher mathematics do not inspire him to return home and grow potatoes; geography of continents, Virgil and algebra cannot impress upon him the dignity and blessedness of an

What is wrong, and shamefully wrong, are the principals'of his education. You can take an oath that



if the boys are any good and learn what is what about right farming, it won't be long before they, instead of their fathers, change conditions on the farm. With sorrow we say that it is almost useless to endeavor to change the ideas of sixty years. The Toe Board of Directors are composed change the ideas of sixty years. The farm boy is the man from Missouri in h!s make-up. You have got to "show" him. How are you going to do it? We will tell you. Educate him in the terms of his environment; give him a practical or two and learn something about the chemistry of the soil, something of the nature of weeds and plants, something about different methods of tillage; let him find out that he can find a larger field for his mental and physical abilities on the farm than he can ever find in the city. If he attends lectures on live stock, the desire to improve what you have on the farm will make him anxious to return and help you out. Teach him to grow two ears of corn where one grew before and you have solved the problem. A knowledge of the mysteries of nature, of the phenomena of plant life, of the means to improve and care for live stock, are binding ties which will hold the son on the farm
