The Law Regarding Newspapers.

1. Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post office, whether in his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the payment.
2. If a person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay up all arrears, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and then collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the office or not.
3. In suits for subscriptions, the suit may be instituted in the place where the paper is published, although the subscriber may reside hundreds of miles away.
4. The courts have decided that refusing newspapers or periodicals from the post office or removing and leaving them uncalled for, while unpaid, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

Cattle Trade Prospects.

Canadian stock feeders who are fattening steers for the British market are exceedingly anxious to know more about the prices which are likely to rule there during the coming season of navigation. Shippers who lost more or less money on their transactions last year are declaring that they will pay no such high prices to farmers for their fat steers as they were doing at this date last year, and are endeavoring to spread an impression through the country that the stock feeders will have to take much lower figures for their fat steers than was paid last spring. The reasons given for this proposed reduction in the prices of export cattle are as follows:—

First.—The shippers who lost money on the cattle shipped by them last summer will not run a similar risk this summer, and if they cannot buy with a larger prospective

margin for profit they will keep out of the business altogether.

Second.—The order for slaughtering all Canadian cattle at the port of arrival on the other side will take away all advantages which Canadian cattle had over other foreign cattle in former years.

Third.—The utterly uncalled for order prohibiting Canadian cattle from being forwarded to Britain through American territory will deprive the cattle shipper of a competitive route and place him more at the tender mercies of the owners of Canadian shipping, who will use it to squeeze out all the profits that the trade will bear, and, in most other commercial transactions and political juggling, the poor farmer will have to pay the piper, let dance who will.

Fourth.—Trade in Britain is considerably depressed and consequently the people there are not likely to consume so much flesh meat as when the times were better.

So much for the pessimistic side of the prospects for cattle export, now let us see what can be advanced on the other side of the question.

First.—Fat cattle are now bringing the same rates in British markets as were being paid there twelve months ago, and the numbers of cattle and sheep have been greatly reduced in the British Isles during the year, as the scarcity of fodder last autumn led British feeders to thin out their herds and flocks, much more than usual, thereby glutting the markets with second and third class meat and depressing prices below anything that has been experienced for many years; consequently, there will be fewer homed live stock to draw this season's supplies from.

Second.—The prices of beefs in Chicago are now seventy-five cents per 100 pounds higher than at this date last year, and live hogs are more than three dollars per 100 lbs. higher than on March 18, 1892, and as Chicago is the chief source from which British meat-eaters draw their foreign supplies, the high prices there will lead to an improved demand, and better prices being paid for Canadian beefs.

Third.—The restricting order preventing Canadian cattle from being sent alive to interior towns and cities in Britain, will probably be removed after a few cargoes have been landed, and it is not at all likely that Yankees will continue the silly order against Canadian cattle travelling over their railways after the navigation opens on the St. Lawrence route, as the continuance of such restrictions will only tend to damage American and benefit Canadian shipping ports.

Fourth.—The Columbian Exposition at Chicago will cause an enormous increase in the home consumption of American meats, and as the supplies are much smaller than they were a year ago prices will continue high throughout the summer.

Lastly.—The Canadian fat cattle for which the farmers got 5 1/2 to 5 3/4 per lb. last spring were sold at a profit in the early part of the summer in Britain and it was chiefly with the later shipments that the losses were made, and since British prices are at present as high as they were a year ago and are almost certain to rule higher throughout the season of 1893 than during 1892, the Canadian feeder should receive at least as much, if not more than he got for them last spring.—Witness.

After being interred at Ingersoll for thirty-four years the remains of the mother of Mrs. Jerome Rymph, of Janestown, N. Y., were removed from the Ingersoll cemetery to the Tisonburg cemetery this week. The cherry coffin was found to be almost as sound as when first buried.
