reservation. 4th. That settlers shall have the right to cut all the timber they require for their

5th. The hay tax.

6th. The mining regulations. 8th. That all judicial powers be taken from the Mounted Police in settled centres such as Calgary, McLeod, Medicine Hat,

9th. That no member of the Mounted Police shall have the power to enter, in the discharge of his duty, a private building without a search warrant; and that no member of the force be entitled to any pertion of a fine.

10th. To define the respect ve powers the N.W.M.P. and the Municipal Police. 11th. That a Gaol and Court House are absolutely necessary to this District.

12th. In order to secure the capture of horse thieves, a telegraph line should be built to Fort McLeod. 13th. That there should be a resident

Coroner in each settled district, and that such Coroner should be a medical man 14th. That a delegation be sent to Ottawa


