DEAD LETTERS.

letter delivered to the wrong person in conseze of his name being the same as that of the ma for whom the letter really intended, should be see returned to the postmaster from whom reind, the party writing on the cover "opened by through mistake," and signing his name thereto.

Letters posted without any direction, or addressed imperfectly that they cannot be forwarded to their maded destinations, and also unpaid or insufficially paid letters addressed to countries to which is cannot be sent without the postage is pre-paid telurned to the writers through the Dead Letter is.

information can be given respecting letters the pass through a post office except to the perlowhom they are addressed.

Parties desiring their letters and papers to be redirected should send an intimation to that effect, in writing, to the postmaster of the office from which letters and papers are to be directed.

Postmasters are allowed to re-direct letters to the known places of residence of the parties to whom they are addressed, after allowing a reasonable time to clapse without their being called for.

Letters and papers are not subject to any additional charge when re-directed from one post office in Canada to another post office in Canada.

Postmasters are instructed not to receive any letter or packet which there is good reason to believe contains glass or anything likely to injure the contents of the mail bag or the person of any officer of the post office.

The transmission of indecent photographs, or prints and immoral books, papers or publications through the Post is strictly prohibited, and all packets containing such articles should be stopped and sent to the Postmaster-General.

A postmaster is not legally bound to furnish change; but may require that the exact amount of postage on any letter or packet be tendered to him in current coln, or in Canada postage stamps.

Postmasters and their assistants in the above matter as well as in all their official intercourse with the public, are expected to afford every accommodation, and to treat every person having business at their offices with the utmost courtesy.

Letters cannot be delivered at any intermediate office en route, but must be conveyed to the office to which they are addressed.

N.B.—The Currency amount to be added for any broken sum between the pounds Sterling, viz., from \$1 to £5, will of course be taken from the scale above. Thus tor an Order of £3 18s. 11d. Sterling: £3 is \$14 60; and, for 18s. 11ds. \$4.60, which will give the full value of the Order, viz., \$19.20.

BILL STAMPS.

Bill Stamps.—Are distributed for sale very generally throughout the Post Offices in the Province: these stamps are of various values from 1 cent upwards. Bill stamps cannot be used in pre-payment of postage.

Law Stamps.—Are also for sale at the principal Post Offices in Lower Canada.

General Regulations.—Postmasters and certain other officers of the department are exempt from serving on juries or inquests. This exemption applies to mail carriers, but not to assistants appointed and payed by postmasters.

Postmasters are not authorized to give credit for postage, if they do so it is entirely at their own risk.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction. On no application however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer, or to any other person.

A letter addressed to a firm may be delivered to any member of the firm. If addressed to several persons it may be delivered to any one of them.
