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MISSIONARY WORK IN PAST AGES.

WE have the experience of more than eighteen centuries to guide us in our study of the great question, How can the Church best bring her members to discharge the duty of sending into all the world and making disciples of all nations? The answer has been furnished not once or twice but frequently. It has not always been the same. At one time she has stood with the poorest and weakest classes in society; wielding no more influence than they did; obliged to take refuge with them in dens and caves; offering in secret their worship to the King of kings, and ministering His gifts and graces and consolations to them. She has, too, shared the Monarch's throne and occupied the highest place, with all its power and influence at her disposal.
