Four thousand Russiane, 5.09 Gorman and 1,000 French troops, with a detachment of Austrian marines, began the attack upon the Poitang forts at daylight. The attack was answered briskly from the forts, the bombardment continuing until noop, but it was noticed that the forts did not roply after 10 relock. The allies were much chagrined as they belloved they had the place completely surrounded, making escape impossible; yet over 8,000 men got away in broad daylight. The Russian attilitery fire had proved offective, and the forts were badly damaged. Li Hung Chang has caused a proclamation to be posted in the ptinipal cities of the Chill Provinces calling upon the people and soldiers to exterminate all the boxers.

This means that about 850 of the Canada milanty will be drafted into some English regions for the remainder of their period of service.
