the session. Reports were received of the Superintendent's work during summer, and from over thirty of the missionaries employed in the world. The Conference was instructed to prepare the schedule of claims for the past six months to be laid before the Assembly's Home Mission Committee. Mr. Findlay was directed to see what arrangement may be practicable in order to organize a new station at Pickeral Lake in Muskoka, petitioned for by residents. The Presbytery recommended the Home Mission Committee to appoint ordained missionaries at Sudbury, at Myrnetawan, at Medema, and at Sunbilge, and to give a grant to Byrg Inlet where Mr. G. W. Logic, student, has consented to labour for the following twelve months. M. H. Knox was appointed to Mincing and Craighurst for the present. On motion of D. Campbell, it was agreed to lay before the Home Mission the matter of supplying the fishermen on the Lakes with services during their summer occupation. The Presbytery agreed to a resolution of sympathy with the Rev. R. B. Taylor and family in account of the death of his son by drowning at Sturgeon Falls while engaged as missionary there.—ROBERT MOODIE, Clerk.

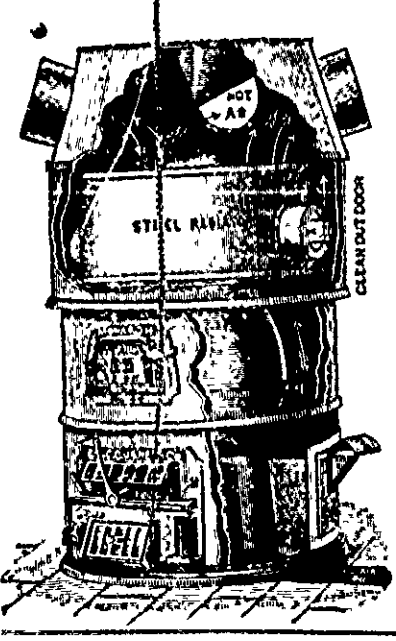
