but, as the receipts are small for the same reasons that affect the supply of other farm products, what do come in meet a ready market at figures that

net about 12c. to shippers from the country.

GREEN FRUIT.—The market is flooded with apples, pears, peaches, grapes and tomatoes, which are imported in large quantities by several firms in this city by both lines of weekly steamers from Roston. Still, the domand is brisk and increasing, and importers receive many orders from country merchants, so that a large proportion of the receipts is distributed through the Province immediately after arrival. A few local tomatoes are beginning to come in and they will coon be plentiful.

DRIED FRUIT.—There has been little doing in the way of actual business in dried fruit. Raisins have been quiet with but little demand. For old stock prices rule unchanged for what little business is doing. The first shipments to this side from Denia are expected to be made in a few days, but

they cannot possibly reach here for three or four weeks or more.

TEAS .- The tea market is fairly active, all arrivals being picked up quickly. Advices from Japan state that the tea market there rules steady, business being chiefly in the lower grades. The continuance of favorable rates of exchange has, no doubt, weighed with buyers, and although having been generally made to buy on a lower basis, the natives, by holding firmly, have prevented any decline. English advices continue rather discouraging, but prices there are likely to be favorably affected if silver should advance, as many predict it will. In the meantime the Japanese farmers have dis posed of two thirds of their crop and are in a good position to carry what remains, so that no important change is likely.

Coffee continues in good enquiry, and values rule firm under light

Sugar.-Now that the immediate wants of grocers have been filled the market for soft sugars is easier-a common and expected result being a sag back from extreme figures after the recent large transactions. There are, however, stready signs of improvement discernable, and very soon, when the sugars now in wholesale hands have gone into consumption another brisk period is expected. From Montreal it is reported that "the sugar from the new refinery at Woodside, Halifax, has been well received by jobbers here. It has been all taken up, but some heavy shipments are expected shortly."

Molasses.-The molasses market is very quiet. There is little offering on spot, but additional supplies are understood to be on the way.

Figh.—The local fish situation has developed no change except that new

dried fish have been in rather larger receipt than hitherto this season. A few scattering lots of horring and mackerel are being taken, but they are much scarcer than could be desired. Squid have been in rather better supply, and as they are a favorite food for deep sea fish, such as cod, haddock, cusk, halibut, etc., it is hoped that the fishing business will improve from this time till the close of the season. Our outside advices are as follows:—Montreal, August 25,—"The market has sagged somewhat since last writing, and we quote salmon at 14 cents. Halibut are scarce and wanted at 14c. Haddock and cod rule at 5c. Lobsters are scarce here although the catch has been a large one. We quote 15 cents. Advices from Labrador say that the season so far has been a successful one. Not only is this true of traps and seines, but also of punt fishermen, who have secured the best catches for many years. Fishing has also been good on the New Brunswick coast, but mackerel have fallen off and herring have come in their place. Dry fish are coming in, but only in very small quantities, the fishermen being unable to cure them in consequence of the very hot weather. Salt fish quiet and unchanged. Stocks of salmon are very light, and will continue so until the new pack comes in next September. We quote as follows:—Labrador salmon \$15 in bbls., \$8 in half bbls.; mackerel \$20 per bbl., \$10 in half bbls., \$1 50 per kit; No. 1 Labrador herring \$4 50 per bbl., \$2.50 per half bbl.; halibut \$5 in half bbls.; green cod \$5.50 in 200 lb. bbls.; haddock \$5. No finnan haddies in the market. Smoked herrings 16½c. to 17c. per box."
