become injured by exposure to the weather. The congregation was also without a clergyman for a considerable time, but in the fall of the year 1805, the Rev. Johnstone Vicars was placed in charge of the mission, and in the spring of last year a more hopeful and carnest spirit was infused into the people, meetings were held to consider whether the church could not be proceeded with, and it was then ascertained that there was a reasonable prospect of erecting the building. Plans and specifications were speedily procured, the necessary contracts taken, and before unny menths had clapsed the walls of a neat church were up, the roof put on, and the contractors nearly all paid. Now the ladies of the congregation have resolved ou raising funds to procure some of the necessary furniture for the church, which is expected to be ready for opening by the month of May. We take this opportunity of expressing an earnest hope that the members of the English Church in this Town, and the County generally, will duly appreciate the efforts of their fellow-churchmen in Erin, and afford them all the help and encouragement in their power.—Gudph Advertiser.
