basis for the moment, since specific requests have not yet reached the federal government.

I should say also that the affected homes are insured for the most part under the National Housing Act. The minister responsible for Housing and Urban Affairs is aware of the situation and has sent representatives there.

For the moment, the government has indicated its complete desire to help the victims. Units of the Canadian Forces are on the spot, as I said earlier, and we are expecting further reports from our staff. And if, of course, requests come in from the municipal or provincial government, the federal government is ready to help as much as possible.

I know that locality very well having visited it on several occasions. I also express my condolences to the representative for the riding which includes St. Jean-Vianney. I am sure the whole population of Canada was dismayed this morning on learning the bad news.

Mr. Gilles Marceau (Lapointe): Mr. Speaker, I want to thank my colleagues, on behalf of the people of St. Jean-Vianney, who will certainly appreciate very much the fact that the members of the House of Commons sympathize with them in the terrible disaster they have just suffered.

I should like to extend officially my heartfelt condolences to the stricken families and to inform this House of the magnitude of the disaster. There were 34 houses completely buried, 25 casualties and more than \$2 million worth of damages.

Therefore, I urge the government to take speedy action, in these circumstances, and I intend to ask as soon as possible for financial assistance from the government.

CO-ORDINATION OF ECONOMIC IMPACT OF GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS

Hon. Robert L. Stanfield (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask the Minister of Finance whether, in view of the emphasis given to the matter by the chairman of the Economic Council of Canada and others, he proposes to adopt any new measures to assure a greater co-ordination of the economic impact of the various departments of the government in which he is Minister of Finance?

Hon. E. J. Benson (Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, with respect to the economic impact of the various departments that are in the economic field, the government believes that there is ample co-ordination at the present time in that there is constant consultation between the ministers involved and they are on a committee which deals with economic matters.

Mr. Stanfield: In view not only of the emphasis placed on this question yesterday by the chairman of the Economic Council but also the emphasis placed on it by the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, will the minister not treat it as an urgent matter to re-examine the coordination, or is he in fact satisfied to have the efforts of his colleague, the Minister of Regional Economic Expansion, offset by his own rather hamhanded efforts?

Mr. Benson: Mr. Speaker, without referring to hamhanded efforts, on which the hon. gentleman across the way is an expert, I would simply like to say that we are constantly looking at the co-ordination of policies.

PROPOSED JAMES BAY HYDRO-ELECTRIC PROJECT—DIS-CUSSIONS WITH QUEBEC FINANCE MINISTER ON METHOD OF FINANCING
