PARLIAMENTARIANS GLOBAL ACTION—FIVE CONTINENT PEACE INITIATIVE

Mr. Barry Turner (Ottawa—Carleton): Mr. Speaker, along with some of my House colleagues I recently participated in a parliamentary forum at the United Nations sponsored by Parliamentarians Global Action. This unique, non-partisan group of over 600 parliamentarians from 35 countries on all continents, has an unprecedented track record.

No NGO has ever been able to mobilize so quickly and so successfully the leaders of six nations, Mexico, Sweden, India, Greece, Tanzania, and Argentina, into the powerful force called "The Five Continent Peace Initiative" that now shapes public opinion on the need to focus more on disarmament and development in the world.

Professor J. K. Galbraith's plea that we bring the world military power into full, candid, and open discussion by focusing on arms buyers as well as arms sellers was echoed by Peru's Prime Minister and Vice-President, Dr. Luis Castro. Canada's Ambassador for Disarmament, Doug Roche, in an October 16 speech to the UN General Assembly, stated:

The current levels and trends in global military expenditures stand in sombre contrast to the state of the world economy.

I call on all parliamentarians and the Government to assist in the vital search for a solution to end the arms build-up.

God help us all if we fail!

FAIR TREATMENT URGED

Mr. David Orlikow (Winnipeg North): Mr. Speaker, at the First Ministers' Conference, and at a fund-raising affair in Calgary the other night, the Prime Minister (Mr. Mulroney) criticized the Premier of Manitoba and defended the indefensible decision to give the CF-18 contract to Montreal on the grounds that Manitoba had a low rate of unemployment.
