
Dear Sir Arthur:-

I am enclosing a rather scrappy and rambling report of my recent visit to some British Universities.

Naturally, there was more to learn from the Scotch Universities because they are more on our own lines. I may say that I hadn't an opportunity to see some of the newer English Universities such as Leeds and Liverpool. I intended visiting the former, and indeed had set out to do so from York, but owing to a mistake as regards time tables I failed to make connections, and as my tour was arranged in advance and I could not stay any longer without upsetting everything, I was obliged to return from Harrogate without carrying out my purpose. On account of lack of time I was not able to stop over at Liverpool at all on my way from Glasgow to Oxford. I am convinced, however, from what I read and learned in conversation with the Registrars of the Universities which I did visit, that the administration and general organization of these Universities is somewhat similar to those in Edinburgh and Glasgow.

It was a great privilege to see as many of these great British institutions as I did see. It all tends to give one a wider vision and so to help, not only in the special field of University work but also in other respects, and I am exceedingly grateful for the assistance I received towards this end.
