Parts of general Commerce began to refume its refpective Force, and the Willingness which the Queen shewed, upon each Occasion, to facili ite all Defigns. whatfoever for the Improvement of her Dominions, the Employment of her Subjects, and the Sale of the Produce of their Industry, was fo powerful in its Confequences, that by rapid Degrees, the Face of Things had undergone a total, and fuccessful Alteration. All the Complaints which had formerly made against the Syftem of Government were, now, converted into a general Approbation; proceeding from the most valuable Part of the Subjects of Elizabeth; by whom must be underftood Those who felt a Desire, in all Chearfulness, and Honefty; of augmenting their Poffeffions, and of turning to the utmost Advantage the laudable Zeal, which their Sovereign had difplayed for the Encouragement of those Measures which were the most conducive for the Welfare of the Public."
