ation increased accomodation was needed, particularly in the south end of the city. Christ Church was built and opened for service in 1863, and the present Dean of Huron and Rector of the Cathedral was appointed the first incumbent. The growth af the city has been so rapid that new Churches have been erected, the "Memorial Church," All Saints and St. Matthews in the east, St. Georges in the the west, St. James in the south and St. John the Evangelist, in the north, thus London with a population of 40,000, has now eight Churches of England.

The Very Rev. Dean Innes came to St Paul's in 1868 as Curate to the then Dean Isaac Hellmuth, and since 1871 has presided over the congregation, altogether a period of thirty-two years.
