CHIEF MONEY WINNERS OF THE GRAND CIRCUIT

Record Amount of Cash Was Dis-
tributed During Harness Sea-
son Just Closed.

From a money distribution standpoint the
Grand Circuit of 1913 was one of the
richest, if not the richest in the history
of that organization. A table of statistics
concerning the 1913 Grand Circuit classics
gives in brief the facts, which are as fol-
lows:

The gross amount raced for by cam-
paigning horsemen during the past season
was \$15,128. This was stake money ex-
clusively, and does not include several
thousand dollars in purse events.

The most interesting feature of the
history of the division of this stake money
is that 15 horses of all those campaigns
brought home the \$21,128 to their own-
ers. This is an almost unbelievable fact
when it is known that hundreds of horses
are contesting for this big money each
week of the Grand Circuit racing season.
