### **NATURE'S MONUMENT** TO PERSON'S MEMORY


Sprout From Poplar Wood Coffin Grows Into Tree That Towers Above Grave.



For the dipping process the eggs re placed in flat wire baskets, each with a capacity of 300 to 500 eggs. One basket is sipped after the other, and by employing a large vessel several baskets may be dipped simultaneously. In this manner two or three persons can dip 200,000 eggs per day. 
