Victims All British Steamers -

Five Lives Reported Lost.

LONDON, Aug. 22 .--- The British steamers Windsor and William Dawson have met with disaster. The Windsor, a vessel of 6055 tons, has, according to a report issued here, been sunk, while the

William Dawson, an old steamer of 284 tons, has been blown up. The crew of the Windsor were saved, but five men of the Dawson's crew were lost. The British steamer Cober has also been sunk by a submarine. The captain and crew have landed safely.

The Cober, a vessel of 3060 tons gross, The CODET, a Vessel of 3060 tons gross, 340 feet long, with a beam of 49 feet, was last reported to have sailed from Karachi June 30 for Gibraltar. She was built at West Hartlepool in 1904, and was owned by the London and Northern Steamship Commany Ltd Company, Ltd.
