Probably nine out of ten of the farmers old not know of the provision of these tables. Whoever is in charge of the market should direct the farmers and stop the overcrowding at the south end of the building, as it was, at times, almost impossible to get thru the crowd.

It was an old time market on Saturday, thousands of the citizens availing themselves of the privilege of buying from the firmers direct.
