That the O. L. A. senior series appears

Secretary Knott reports that the Sham-
rocks of West Toronto and Weston have
applied to him for senior certificates, and
have stated emphatically that there is no
truth whatever in the statement that they
will continue in the ranks of the C.L.A.,
but will carry out their original promise
to join the new forces. Their respective
managers also point out that, while their
fees were paid by the C.L.A. convention,
their delegates attended the O.L.A. con-
vention in person, in addition to paying
their fees, and naturally, their repre-
sentations lie where their officers made it a
point to attend, in order to see how the
business of the O.L.A. was transacted.
The threat of the O.L.A. as to their
being banned if playing against Young
Toronto has not had the least effect,
knowing that it emanates only from their
old rivals in the C.L.A.
It has been remarked on more than one
occasion that the fact of the O.L.A. gain-
ing ground by having both Weston and
Young Shamrock join their ranks, is
