NOTICE **R'S DIARY** TIONARY Beets.—One good beet will produce more than enough seed for an average vacant lot or city garden. Before the will-shaped specimens, in case anything should happen to one, and set aside until spring, making sure that the beet is of good, dark color by taking a small piece out. When the soil is ready for seeding, plant the beet deep enough in the ground so that the top will be slightly below the surface. The flower stalks will soon be thrown up and when the plant is well grown it is desirable to the seed will ripen at one time. 
