PREVALENCE OF BRIBERY TAKES MAN'S DISGUISES

Rev. J. B. Silcox Preaches a Strong Sermon on the Present-Day Evil.

Rev. J. B. Silcox addressed a large audience in Bond-street Congregational Church last evening, drawing strong present-day lessons from the story of "Balaam, the bribed young man."

"The man who holds office and who takes a bribe sells himself to Satan as surely as did Balaam when he took the 20 pieces of silver.

"When a minister of the Gospel allows himself to be gagged lest he offend some of his congregation, he is bribed. He betrays the truth of God for gold.

"When a statesman shrinks his vote or refuses to champion the cause of what his conscience tells him is right and just, he is bribed.

"When an editor, for the sake of an increased subscription list, advocates what his conscience condemns, he has degraded the press to the propagation of error and has sold his conscience and his intellect to the service of Satan.

"When a business man refuses to take a stand against wrong in the community lest he lose customers and cash, he is a bribed man and has sold his duty to base expediency.

"When a lawyer, for a fee, defends that which is against the law and endorses a criminal, he is a bribed man and has taken a reward against the innocent.

"Thus, in a multitude of ways—some of them leading to dire consequences—men allow themselves to be bribed."

Continuing, Mr. Silcox held that the spoils system was a species of bribery. Men clamored for reform on the ground of service to the party in having done its dirty work.

The man who bribed was the worst enemy of national and social life. The foreigner who came to the country because of his poverty was easy prey for the man who would buy his vote and thus hindered in becoming a good citizen.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS LIBERALS WILL STAY OUT OF E. HAMILTON ELECTION

Practically Endorse Labor Candidate and Condemn Whitney Government.

Hamilton, Nov. 18.—(Special.)—The Liberals at their convention Saturday night decided not to place a candidate in East Hamilton and practically endorsed the labor candidate, Allen Stumholme. This resolution, which sums up the whole situation, was passed.

That the Liberals of Hamilton this day in convention assembled as Liberals and citizens, strongly disapprove of the action of the Ontario government in removing the Ontario Normal College from this city, and desire to protest against the policy of the government in allowing private interests to prevail with that of honest workmen of this province; but that, owing to the fact that the present legislature will hold only two more sessions, and that necessary and legitimate work and expenditure of money in the contest would be considerable, and that the interests of the labor party in the present contest are identical, no candidate be nominated by the Liberal party.

James Chisholm, president of the Liberal Association, presided at the meeting, and addresses were given by J. J. Scott, K.C., and Dr. H. Adam Zimmerman, M.P., and Dr. H. Adam Zimmerman, M.P. He referred to Hon. G. W. Ross would welcome a labor man in the house. He accused J. J. Scott, K.C., of the conspiracy of the candidate of taking in stride the Conservative, Liberal and labor platforms. Adam Zimmerman said that a labor man was never more needed in the legislature than now. He referred to Mr. Scott as a Tribby in pants under the hypnotic spell of Whitney, and to Hon. J. S. Hendrie as being treated by the cabinet as the tail of a kite.

Electrician Killed. Henry Cowing, 31 Euclid-avenue, was killed to-day that the electrician, Frank A. Cowing, had been electrocuted at Raven Lake. The deceased was an electrician. The remains will be brought to Hamilton for burial.

During the course of a temperance lecture in Association Hall this afternoon Rev. C. O. Johnston stated that he understood there was a movement on foot in Hamilton to establish a hospital for drunks. He endorsed the scheme. He also said that Hon. G. W. Ross was a going opportunity when he neglected to accept prohibition as his platform.

Want 7000 Horsepower. Ald. Stewart and the board of works are meeting with great success in their efforts to interest the power users of the city in the cheap electric power scheme. In less than a week they have received applications for 7000 horse-power, and they expect this to be increased to 10,000. That is exclusive of what the city corporation will require.

It is understood that John Lennox & Co., G. F. Glasco and George W. Robinson will establish a large wholesale house on East King-street. The Mercantile Trust Company, organized by Hamilton men, will likely have its head office in the Bank of Hamilton building.

License Inspector Regan of South Wentworth has resigned his position. He will leave in a short time for the Northwest.
