RECIPROCITY STILL WITH US.

In a letter to the New York Times, Prof. Goldwin Smith points out the advantages of closer trade relations between the United States and Canada. He says in part: "If the constant flow of Canadian migration into the United States and the present rush of American migration into Canada do not impair nationality on either side it is likely to be impaired by the interchange of goods."

"Canadian imperialists anxiously protest that there is no such thing as annexationism in Canada. What is certain is that question is not at present in any way before Canadian people, or so far as appears to us before American people."

The writer does not think the American senate can permanently veto reciprocity.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

CIVIC LIGHTING PLAN ENQUIRIES TO BE MADE

Board of Works Appoints a Committee—"Cataract" to Be Pursued.

Hamilton, Jan. 25.—(Special.)—The new board of works had its first meeting this evening. A special committee was named to make enquiries as to the cost of establishing a plant to light the city streets. The contract with the Cataract Company will expire in July, 1909. The city solicitor was instructed to advise the company that unless it reduced the street lighting rate from \$85 to \$65 a lamp per year the city would proceed at once with abolition. The city's claim already amounts to \$20,000. Steps will be taken to compel the company to put its wires underground, and the city solicitor was asked to bring in a report as to the city's power in the matter. The T. H. & B. asks for permission to build a mill from its present freight line to the Westinghouse Company. A large deputation protested that Hamilton was becoming nothing more than a railway yard. The city engineer was asked to go over the route with a special committee Saturday afternoon to see if some less objectionable route cannot be chosen. The teamsters applied for an increase of pay from 4c to 5c an hour; referred to a sub-committee. The board foreman's application for an increase from \$15 to \$17 a week was laid over. Chairman Stewart, who had passed the age limit, and it is likely he will be retired.

Parks Board Insistent. The parks board decided to insist upon having its full appropriation of \$18,500. The payment of \$2000 on the Woodlands Park mortgage was made. An appropriation of \$1000 was set aside for the North End Park.

The fourth annual bachelors' ball was held at the Hotel Royal to-night. The hotel was handsomely decorated. About 150 couples attended. The supper and service given by the hotel management was beyond reproach.

The harbor and beach committee will make efforts to get control of the city dock property, and will tear down the sheds and make other improvements. At their meeting this afternoon Thomas Beatty was reappointed caretaker of the swimming baths. A committee was appointed to see that the Hamilton Power Company does not fence in all the roadways running across the beach.

The West Pipe Band gave its annual concert and ball at the armories, Col. Logie presided.

Business Men's Club. Some of the business men of the city will apply to the Ontario legislature for a charter for a business men's club. John T. Hall, assessment commissioner, has been offered a year to become publicity agent for Medicine Hat.

E. J. Brebner, a well-known tailor, was arrested this morning and taken to St. Catharines on a charge of fraud. The St. Catharines branch of his business assigned and it is charged that part of the goods from the branch were removed to Hamilton.

The bricklayers and masons will have an eight-hour day, with pay at the rate of 47 1/2 cents an hour, beginning on April 1, and the carpenters have also been granted an increase to 40 cents an hour, with an eight-hour day.

TORONTO JUNCTION.

Toronto Junction, Jan. 25.—A special meeting of the town council was held to-night. Communications were received from G. W. P. Hoag re income tax, and referred to the executive committee.

The resignation of J. Clark from the board of health was accepted. E. L. Pin of Toronto offered \$20 for the old timber taken out of the Weston road bridge; referred to property committee. J. Broom notified the council that unless the council would take action to recover to the amount of \$1000; referred to the claims committee. Councilor Irwin informed the council that there is a petition in circulation asking the council to enter into negotiations with the Bell Telephone Company, with a view of getting the same rates as East Toronto. A bylaw to cancel the franchise of the Toronto Suburban Railway Company on all streets south of Dundas-street was read for the first and second time. A bylaw to take over certain lands on Rutley-street for a new town park was read three times. The solicitor read a petition asking the legislature to enable the council to issue debentures to the amount of \$100,000 to pave Dundas-street, for construction of sewers and for the power to enter into a contract with a company for a supply of water. At the police court this morning, P. Ford of Markham was fined \$100, and costs for assaulting Mrs. Burns, who resides in the same house.
