CEYLON FOR BOER PRISONERS.

Accommodation for 3000 of them in the Centre of the Island Now Being Prepared.

Ceylon, as well as St. Helena, is to be used as a place of exile for the Boer prisoners of war, whom the British expect to take, or have taken. Out at Dytswa, in the Province of Uva, the British are building barracks and sheds for the prisoners, and for the soldiers who are to guard them. Dytswa is a station on the railway, about 100 miles from Colombo, and is very healthy in the centre of the island. Here the Colombo Commercial Company is building 25 sheds, 120 by 40 feet, the Government factory is building 15 sheds, and Messrs. Walker, Sons & Co. are building seven sheds, all of which are to be of the same size. These 47 sheds will be occupied by the Boers, who will number, according to present calculation, between 2000 and 3000. In addition to these sheds, the authorities are putting up a number of barrack buildings, sufficient to accommodate half a battalion of soldiers. There will be 10 cots in each of these barracks, and the barracks will be built with walls lined with light woods and floors boarded. In addition to these 10 buildings there will be others put up for the use of the officers, hospitals and cooking outfits.

If prisoners are to be congratulated, the Boers certainly are, only for the natural beauty of the country in which they are to pass the days of their captivity. There is hardly another country in the world as beautiful as Ceylon—certainly not another tropical country. At the altitude Dytswa the climate will be pleasant and healthy, and the prisoners ought to make their imprisonment as pleasant as enforced detention anywhere could possibly be.

This is not the first time that Ceylon has been used to harbor exiles or prisoners of war. It was to this island that Arabi Pasha, who for a time was practically ruler of Egypt, in 1882, and some important followers of his were sent nearly 28 years ago. They were stationed in Kandy in the interior, and spent most of their days in that most beautiful of all tropical mountain cities. During the latter years of their exile they were free to travel anywhere on the island, without restraint or surveillance, the only restriction being that they must not leave Ceylon. It was largely a matter of honor.

RUSSIA WANTS A NEW TRIAL.

Of the Cruiser Varian, Built at the Cramp Shipyard, Before Formal Acceptance. Philadelphia, Sept. 3.—Orders have been received from St. Petersburg by the Russian naval inspectors at Cramp's shipyard which will necessitate a new trial by the cruiser Varian before her formal acceptance by the Russian Government. This is due to the accident which happened during the last trial, when the head of one of the electric cylinders was cracked. No date for the new trial has been decided upon. A sustained speed of 23 knots for 12 hours is required by the contract. The vessel exceeded this by 1.6 knots for six consecutive hours when the accident occurred.

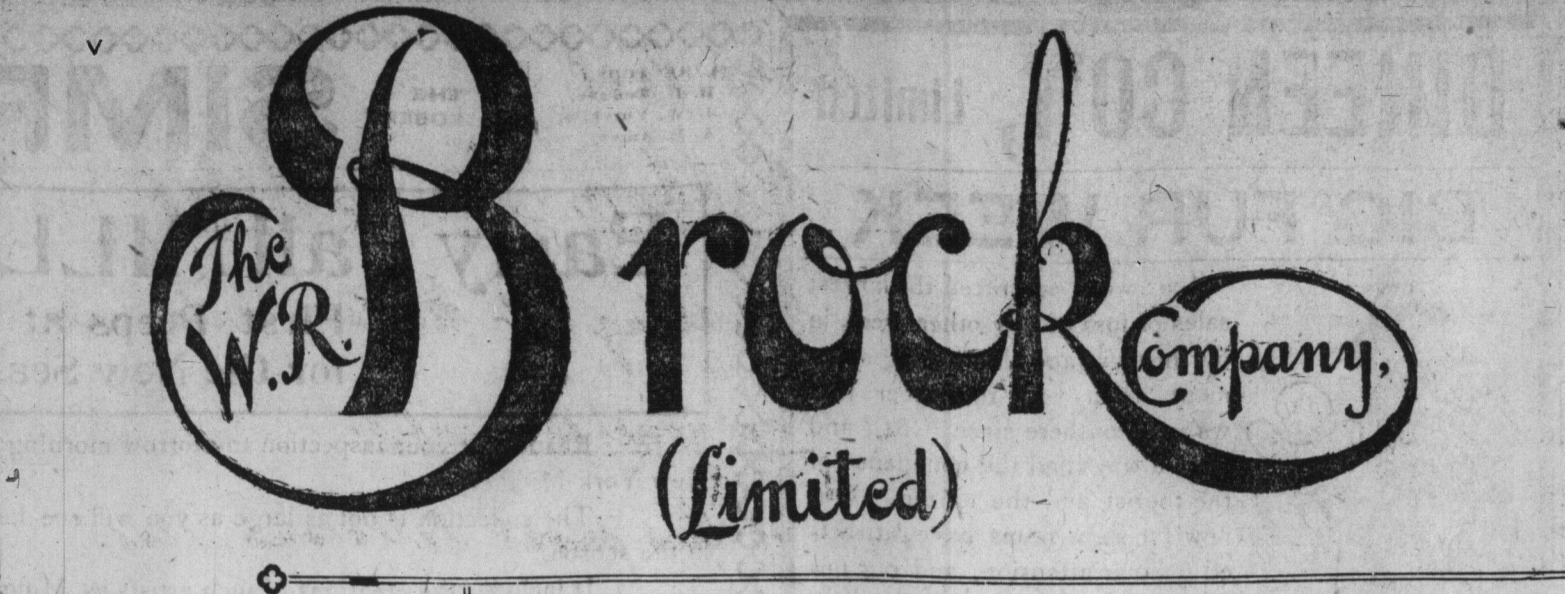
