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Approach of Winter.

Immense flocks of geese have been seen flying south from Northern Canada. This, observers say, is a much earlier date than usual, and indicates the sudden approach of cold weather.

Already we have had sharp frosts in this part of Canada, but on the whole the weather has been comparatively mild. In the far north, however, ice formed in the streams weeks ago.

A private letter from Scotland says snow fell this year at a phenomenally early date. Only twice during the last 126 years has snow fallen at so early a period. This year the snow came on Oct. 10; but taking the average of the past century and a quarter, the date of the first snow fall works out—Nov. 24, the earliest appearance of winter occurring in 1817, when snow fell on Oct. 1. In the winter of 1857-58 the first snow fell on Jan. 31 of the latter year, the season being abnormally mild till the middle of February.

Topics of Today.

Prof. Bell, of Ottawa, suggests that the name of the new coal substance found at Sudbury should be carbonite. A similar burning material found in New Brunswick is known as albertite.

Great is the wheel! A woman's association in Winnipeg has cancelled the engagement of Evangelist Chivers because at revival services held by him a few nights since, circulars against bicycle riding were distributed, which have given much offense to many of the women present.

Another rich discovery of gold ore is reported from Northwestern Ontario. The new find is said to be situated about twelve miles from the Empress mine on Jack Fish Bay.

Toronto Collegiate Institute Board has abolished scholarships.

James Conmee, M.P.P., insists that there is anthracite coal in Northern Ontario, 500 miles north of Sudbury, on the Albany River. The mineral has been burned. Prof. Montgomery, of Trinity University, who was formerly State mineralogist of Utah, says that after blow-type experiments with the Sudbury samples, he found that the coal does not ignite as easily as the ordinary anthracite, but that when once lit, it glows and gives out a strong heat for a longer period. He thinks, therefore, that the coal on the surface samples he has seen, that the coal would prove especially suitable for smelting purposes, more suitable, in fact, for use on a large scale, than in heating stoves. Full investigations will be made by the Ontario Government.

Oil well digging is about as speculative a proceeding as exploring for gold and silver. At Bothwell, one gentleman has a number of wells yielding good returns, one of them averaging 30 barrels a day, but on the other hand there are from fifteen to twenty dry holes that have cost their owners \$400 or \$500 and have not given a barrel of oil in return. Experienced men should always be consulted before lands are leased for prospecting purposes.

One hundred and twenty men are digging for gold, for one company, in Hastings county, Ont.

The Manitoba Cabinet held a three-hours' session to discuss the school settlement. The agreement was practically ratified, but one or two points have to be confirmed by the Dominion. Full details may be known by the middle of the week.

The sentence of three months' imprisonment meted out to Harvey, the Guelph civic defaulter, by Justice Chadwick, will prove a very poor deterrent to men placed under similar temptations.

Hon. Mr. Fielding, Minister of Finance, in a recent interview, said the result of the Presidential elections in the United States was satisfactory to the Canadian Government. He thinks that the questions at issue between the two Governments can be satisfactorily settled. Being told that Sir Charles Tupper had gone to England, he joyfully took steps to have Lord Aberdeen relieved of the Governor-Generalship, because of his alleged over-friendliness to the Liberal party during the recent crisis. Mr. Fielding exclaimed: "Absurd! Lord Aberdeen never at any time exceeded his constitutional authority. The British Government, although now a Conservative one, would hardly interfere to make partisan capital in Canada to please a beaten and disgruntled politician."

NEWSPAPER MEN AT A FEAST.

New York, Nov. 2.—Mark A. Hanna gave a dinner Saturday night to the newspaper men who had regularly "covered" national headquarters either in New York or Chicago during the campaign. The dinner was served in the banquet hall at the Waldorf, and it was an elaborate affair. A little gold and silver ship was provided for each diner as a souvenir. There was also presented to each of the guests a gold medal, the size of a 20c gold piece, inscribed with the words "The fact that it was presented by the national committee inscribed upon it the names of the members of the committee, including McKinley and Hobart, Sound Money and Protection."
