REVERSE FOR
THE FRENCH

Column of Tirailleurs Defeated in Upper Guinea.

The Abyssinian Negus Working in Behalf of Britain Against France—Denial of the Report That French Warships Were Ordered to Brest.

Paris, Oct. 18.—The Politique Coloniale publishes a dispatch from the Ivory coast, Upper Guinea, saying that the French arms have received a serious check. A column of tirailleurs, dispatched to suppress a rising of the Bourbouries, was forced to retreat, with a loss of seven killed and ten wounded. The Bourbouries, the dispatch says, are preparing to march upon Jacquesville, where a number of French trading factories have been established.

A DENIAL.

A semi-official note issued last evening says that the statements to the effect that the French warships, which are being placed on a war footing have been ordered to Brest, is incorrect, and it is added that undue importance has been attached to the incident.

WORKING AGAINST FRANCE.

The Rome Tribune publishes a letter from Aden, which says that French influence with King Menelek is waning and that the Abyssinian Negus is openly working in behalf of England against France. It declares that Menelek prevented the French expedition, headed by M. Bonchamps, from reaching Fashoda, where Major Marchand was to meet it, and also refused to send a force of Abyssinian troops there.

\$150,000 OF JEWELRY STOLEN.

The Dowager Duchess of Sutherland, while on board a train for Calais, bound for London, lost a satchel containing jewelry worth \$30,000. Her Grace left the train at Amiens and reported her loss to the police. It believed that the satchel was stolen, but there is no clue to the thief.

WHY CAVENDISH RETIRED.

M. Leon Darragon, the explorer, states that he was charged by the Negus Menelek to lead an expedition of 15,000 men as far as the fourth degree of latitude, almost exactly south of Adis Ababa, with the object of cutting off the Cavendish expedition, which was marching towards the Nile. Mr. Cavendish consequently retired on the pretext that his expedition was badly prepared, and returned to London. It will be remembered that Mr. Cavendish, who is a relative of the

Duke of Devonshire, led an expedition towards the Nile, which was expected to come into conflict with that of Major Marchand.

HER LATEST
ACQUISITION

Akassa Purchased by the British Government.

Terrible Railway Disaster at Barnet Junction—Irrving Ill—A Dyer's Combine.

Liverpool, Oct. 13.—Advices from West Africa state that the imperial government has bought Akassa from the Royal Niger Company. Akassa has been the Niger Company's distributing point and headquarters for many years. The purchase included the company's slip-houses, sheds and wharves. It was understood that the Niger Company would change their headquarters to Burutu, where they would erect a patent slip of a larger size. About 150 men are engaged clearing away the bush about the place for the erection of sheds, etc., and it is understood that a general depot will be established there. It is also reported that Neawga, the king of the Upper Mendi country, was captured by Captain Blakeney, and brought to Freetown jail. He was one of the most powerful chiefs in the Mendi country where the rebellion took place, and had sworn to drive the white men out of the country. In his part of the country no hut tax was enforced. The Port Lokko chiefs, who had been in Freetown jail for the past eight months, paid the hut tax fines, amounting to nearly \$100, and were released.

A RAILWAY HORROR.

A terrible railway accident occurred last evening on the Great Central Railway, near Barnet, about 11 miles north of London. An express train, going at the rate of a mile a minute, came into collision with a freight train that was switching across the track at Barnet Junction. The express piled up a complete wreck. Nine dead and thirteen seriously injured have been recovered from the wreckage, and there are others under the debris.

IRVING ILL.

Sir Henry Irving's physicians announce that he will not be able to appear on the stage for two weeks. He is suffering from pleurisy, and requires a complete rest.

DR. NANCY.

Dr. Nancy Guildford, the Bridgeport, Conn., midwife, was arraigned in the Bow street police court Monday morning upon extradition proceedings, and further remanded.

A SHINDY.

There was great excitement all night long at Ballinrobe, county Mayo, due to serious collisions between the people there and the police, growing out of a United Irish League meeting.

COMBINE WITH \$25,000,000 CAPITAL.

A dyers' combine is now forming in the Bradford district. It already includes 24 subscribing firms, and represents the whole piece-dyeing industry of the west riding of Yorkshire. The capital will consist of \$25,000,000—three-fifths in ordinary shares, and two-fifths in debentures. Each business will be bought in cash and ordinary shares, and two-thirds of the entire capital will be reserved for the purchase of chemical and dye stuff works of sufficient capacity to supply the combined interests. Only one large firm is not included in this dyers' trust.

CABLE NOTES.

Kipling's new book, "The Day's Work," has reached its 24th thousand, and is probably the greatest success since the autobiography of Bismarck have been sold for \$60,000—\$30,000 from the English, and \$30,000 from the American purchasers—the former, Smith & Elder, and the latter, Harper & Bros.

The imperial yacht Hohenzollern, with the Emperor and Empress of Germany on board, arrived in the Straits of the Dardanelles with her escorts Monday morning.

The president of the Swiss Confederation, M. Ruffy, has received the threatening letters from Anarchists. Precautions are being taken by the police to prevent an attempt on his life.

RAILROADERS
MAY STRIKE

Clash Between the Federation and the M. K. and T. R.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 18.—Because of the discharge of three freight conductors running out of Parsons, Kansas, the Federation of American Railway Employees and the M. K. and T. Railroad will lock horns today in St. Louis. Each side declare there will be no surrender, and in the event compromise fails, there may be a general strike called, extending the entire length of the railway system.

Assistant Grand Chief Carstenson, of the Order of Railway Conductors, has been in St. Louis since Sept. 20, conferring with the M. K. and T. officials. He has been unable to effect a settlement of the grievance in question, which was referred to the executive board of the order by the local union at Parsons. For this reason an appeal was made to a higher power, the Federation of American Railway Employees.

Heads of the great railway organizations arrived last night at St. Louis hotels to attend the conference.

READY FOR
AN EMERGENCY

Large Russian Force Gathered at Port Arthur.

British Government Insists That China's Emperor Be Restored—Excitement Still Prevailing Over the Policy of the Dowager Empress.

London, Oct. 18.—The Odessa correspondent of the Standard says that Russia has hastily concentrated 40,000 men at Port Arthur to be in readiness for any emergency at Pekin.

A dispatch to a London news agency from Shanghai says: Reports from Japanese sources are in circulation here to the effect that Sir Claude MacDonald, British minister to Pekin, has informed the Chinese government that sovereignty appertains solely to the emperor, who had been forcibly abducted and deposed, and that he must be restored to his position, while Kang Yu Wei and the other reformers must be pardoned.

ANOTHER REBELLION.

A rebellion in Nu Han province is certain. Foreigners at Yang Tse ports are in great danger. Most of the residents have left Chung King in the province of Se Chuen, and foreigners at other ports are preparing for a hurried departure.

Lord Charles Beresford, who has been entrusted by the British Government, with a special permission to China, has arrived at Pekin.

RAISED A STORM.

London, Oct. 17.—Pekin advices say excitement still prevails over the triumph of the dowager empress, whose reactionary policy seems likely to result to moderation.

The last and most radical edict issued by the emperor proposed that an annual budget should be issued which should set forth the annual expenses so the people could suggest reforms and means of economizing. He advised the country to embark in the newspaper business for the purpose of educating the people. His edict confiscating temples and other places of worship for educational purposes was opposed from all quarters.

INVESTIGATION
INITIATED

As to the Loss of the Steamer Mohegan.

Fifty-Six Bodies Recovered From the Wreck.

An Unknown Schooner Sunk With All on Board.

Falmouth, England, Oct. 18.—The inquest upon the remains of the victims of the wreck of the Mohegan was adjourned yesterday for a week, in order to allow of the attendance of a representative of the board of trade.

Mr. B. Kelly, one of the rescued passengers, created a sensation by declaring that there were no officers about, except the captain, when they were most needed, to supervise the launching of the boats. The survivors, many of them wounded and carrying their arms in slings, were obliged to ride over 20 miles over the roughest roads from Falmouth to attend the inquest. When the body of the dead was called, one woman's body was claimed by two families; other bodies had no identification.

A. S. Williams, the company's London manager, described the ship as in the finest condition. He said they had had trouble with her boilers on her first voyage, and had withdrawn her from one trip, devoting several weeks to repairing her machinery, which was perfectly adjusted. He described the officers of the Mohegan in the highest terms, laying stress upon the abstinence of Capt. Griffiths.

A juror—Was Capt. Griffiths in good health?

Mr. Williams—I saw him just before the Mohegan started, and he seemed perfectly well then.

The juror—Is it not a fact that he was lying on a couch most of the first day?

Mr. Williams—I should be extremely surprised to hear that. Unfortunately, there is no officer of the Mohegan in the United States. We know that they and the crew did all they could to save the passengers.

Mr. Richard Kelly, messenger—There was not an officer on deck when the crew were trying to get out the boats. The only officers I saw were Capt. Griffiths and another on the bridge.

Mr. Williams—I can prove that all the officers were on deck and aiding to get out the boats.

Mr. Kelly insisted that the boats were improperly arranged, being surrounded by railings, instead of swung on davits, so that they were with difficulty launched.

Mr. Williams contended that the launching of four boats in 20 minutes was good work.

The total number of bodies recovered up to midnight yesterday was 56.

CANADIANS AMONG THE VICTIMS.

Woodstock, Ont., Oct. 18.—Miss Susan Sheppard, who is one of the Mohegan victims, was about 33 years of age. Her father lived in Woodstock for many years, and his widow survived him by fifteen years. After her mother's death Miss Sheppard left Woodstock and went to New York, where she studied as a trained nurse, and graduated from the Bellevue Hospital, and was engaged by the St. John's Guild, New York.

Miss Fraser, another victim, was 20 years of age. She once resided in Woodstock, where her father was dispatcher with the Grand Trunk. From Woodstock
