ATTACK ON RIGA MAY MEAN STARTING OF NEW WAR

Lettish Government Is Expected To Make Appeal for Military Help-Peace Conference Will Be Asked To Furnish Troops To Resist General Von Der Goltz.

London, Oct. 11.—Allied powers have the hardest problem that they have encountered since the armistice, thrust upon them by the German-Russian attack on Riga. It is believed the Lettish Government will expect the peace conference to furnish troops to resist General von der Goltz and his Russian supporters, but who will furnish the new armies is a very serious question. There is certainly no enthusiasm in Great Britain for embarking on more military expeditions and shedding more Eritish blood.

VOLUNTEER ARMY ABSORBED. All of Great Britain's new volunteer army has been absorbed in the making up of forces of occupation in the Near East. Drafted soldiers are still in the service, and their relatives are agitating for their return from India, Egypt and Mesopotamia. At the same time, more than 50,000 troops are engaged as an army of occupation in Ireland. The withdrawal of the British expedition from Archangel has just been fin-ished, under pressure of the strongest public feeling. GERMANY SCHEMING CONTROL.

Latest news received by the Government is described as confirming the view that Germany is deliberately scheming to secure a controlling position in Russia, and that she probably contemplates the occupation of Petrograd. There are more than 100,000 German soldiers with headquarters at Mitau. The Baltic States, with the exception of Finland. appear to have agreed upon a policy of arranging an armistice with the Bolshevik Government, but declining peace terms on the ground that the solict government is too unstable to arrange a permanent peace. Altogether, the Baltic situation is recognized as presenting acutely danger-

Berlin, Oct. 11. — German-Russian troops under Gen. von der Goltz and Col. Avaloff-Bermondt, intend to oust M. Ulmanis. BRITISH TROOPSHIP REPORTED WRECKED OFF NORWAY WITH A LOSS OF TWO THOUSAND LIVES

CAPTURE OF RIGA BY GERMANS HAS NOT BEEN CONFIRMED

"Germany's New War" Is Featured in the London Newspapers.

ATTACK IS CONFIRMED. London, Oct. 11 .- It was stated in authoritative quarters here this afternoon that a German-Russian attack on Riga was carried out on Friday under cover of a heavy bom bardment by German guns, forcing the Letts to evacuate the city.

London, Oct. 11 .- Confirmation of newspaper report that German forces have captured Riga is being awaited here, but if the disparity of the rival forces is as great as reported in some dispatches, the success of the attack on the city would be surprising.

The whereabouts of General you der Goltz continues to be the subject of contradictory rumors and estimates of the size of the army commanded by Col. Avaloff-Bermondt also show a wide divergence. It is recalled that General Count Keller, commander of a large body of soldiers in the Baltic provinces which was recruited from German troops left in Courland by the allies at the time of the armistice, is a Baltic baron, formerly a general in the Russian army.

10 MILLIONS READY

Austrians, Too, Want To Emigrate to America.

Identity of Vessel Has Not Been Ascertained—Loss of This Ship Is the Greatest Sea Tragedy in the World's History Troops Lost Are Believed To Have Been British Soldiers Who Embarked From Arch angel For England.

Archangel, Friday, Oct. 10.-Two thousand lives have been lost in the wreck of an unnamed British ship on the Norwegian coast, according to a wireless dispatch received here from Helsingfors.

If the loss of life in the wreck reported in the foregoing dispatch is as large as indicated, the disaster will mark a new record in the annals of the sea. It would seem probable the ship which was wrecked was a military transport bringing British soldiers from Archangel, from which port Great Britain has been embarking large numbers of men during the last month. It is known that troopships have sailed quite recently from Archangel, Copenhagen advices received yesterday stating that Lettish soldiers who have been on the Archangel front have just landed at Riga, and have been rushed to the front south of that city to meet onslaughts of German and Russian forces.
