## WANT MUTUEL TAX RATE MADE HIGHER

Ottawa, June 1.—It is understood that within a few days a deputation will wait on Dr. Toine, with a view towards having an increase in the mutual tax to ten per cent allowed up to \$20,000. ## HEAVY AUTO TRAFFIC ACROSS ST. CLAIR RIVER

SARNIA, May 31.—All auto traffic records across the River St. Clair from Sarnia to Port Huron were shattered today, when 500 motor cars took from 2 p.m. until 8 p.m. to cross the river, illustrating, despite the constant ferry service how wholly unprepared the company was for the holiday rush.

Motorists from the United States prior to leaving this port loaded their tanks with gasoline, stating that in many American cities there is shortage of the supply. At Port Huron it was reported that the supply in that city was exhausted and many motorists came across to Sarnia to make their purchase of gas.

Today was a holiday in Port Huron, and the traffic on the ferries was the heaviest in recent years, according to a statement issued tonight by the officials of the Sarnia-Port Huron Ferry Company.

## NEWS

**FIRE LOSSES.**—Fire losses in the city for the month of May amount to \$6,000, Chief Aitken stated this morning. The losses for May this year were among the lightest on the records of the department, in spite of the large number of fires.

**SMALL FIRE.**—The fire department made a run to the Grand Trunk cars at 10:34 o'clock this morning and extinguished a fire in the blacksmith shop. Part of a vat and the roof were burned. The damage was slight.

**CUSTOMS RETURNS.**—Customs returns for May amount to \$205,970.56, which is an increase of \$17,550.08 over the same month last year. Last year's returns for the month of May were \$128,524.88.

## TO FIGHT ATTEMPT TO RAISE FARES

L. R. C. To Hold Meeting Friday Night.

To devise ways and means for fighting any attempt to raise the fares on the London Street Railway without the consent of the people, a special meeting of the L. R. C., which is a standing convention of delegates from the soldier and labor organizations of the city, will be held on Friday night in the L. P. rooms on Richmond street. All the labor members of the city council and Dr. H. A. Stevenson, M.P.P., will be asked to attend.

In the belief of members of the L.R.C., any attempt of the city council to give permission to the street railway company to increase the fares without first gaining the consent of the people would be just another attempt to override the wishes of the citizens as expressed at the last municipal elections. It was the L. R. C. who originated and carried on the fight against the city of London bill, and it is expected that the fight against higher fares will be carried along on the same principles.

It is the intention of the city council to bring up a bylaw on Monday night next to give immediate permission to the street railway to increase the fares to 5 cents and six special tickets for 25 cents, as a temporary relief arrangement until the matter can be taken to the people.

How the council can do this is a puzzle to the L. R. C. "We believe the move is mere camouflage," said Wm. Tite today. "When the street railway once has permission to increase the fares it will be a much more difficult matter to fight them in the voting. There is one other thing that is puzzling the labor men of this city. Why does the railway want an increase to 5 cents straight when that will mean an increase of at least \$150,000 in the revenue. It is admitted by the company that the increases in pay to the men will amount to only \$85,000. What is to become of the balance?"

The mayor tells us that the money will be needed by the company to carry out its paving program. We do not see why the working girl should help a big corporation with its paving when a private individual is expected to pay for any pavement running in front of his property.

The company made a fortune during its long fat years. It now can go along on the profits made then. In spite of such leanness in its revenue the street railway had a surplus in 1919 of \$53,000. I can prove that.

It is quite likely that as the result of the meeting on Friday night, that a mass protest meeting will be called. It is quite certain, according to the members of the L. R. C. interviewed, that the matter will be fought to the last ditch. Great confidence is felt that a victory will be gained as the result of the success in the fight against the city of London bill.

According to the members the fight will not be made against the actual raising of the fares so much as against a further attempt to override the people's will by the city council.

## JUNE SESSIONS OPEN BEFORE COUNTY JUDGE

Two Cases To Come Before Grand Jury.

The June session of the Middlesex county court opened in the county buildings this afternoon shortly after 1 o'clock, with Judge Talbot Macbeth presiding. Upon the grand jury being sworn in, Judge Macbeth delivered an address to them, congratulating the members on the fact that there are but two criminal cases for their attention. The first case, that of Alex. Judge, charged with stealing liquor from the railway, was found on the premises of the accused after the theft. He stated that Judge may have a reasonable explanation for the presence of these cases, but until such explanation was forthcoming, a true bill against him from the grand jury was warranted.

The other case, one of indecent assault, in which a 2-year-old girl was the victim, and William Forbes, aged about 16 years was accused, according to Judge Macbeth, is "a very sad case." "As it is a case of a child under 14 years being assaulted," he said, "there is no such thing as consent for any indecent act. If the girl were handled indecently, even though consent were shown, there is nothing to bring in but a true bill."

Concluding, he ordered the jury to visit the jail and asylum. "In so far as any other institutions are concerned," he said, "it is in your own discretion to visit them, and not necessary."

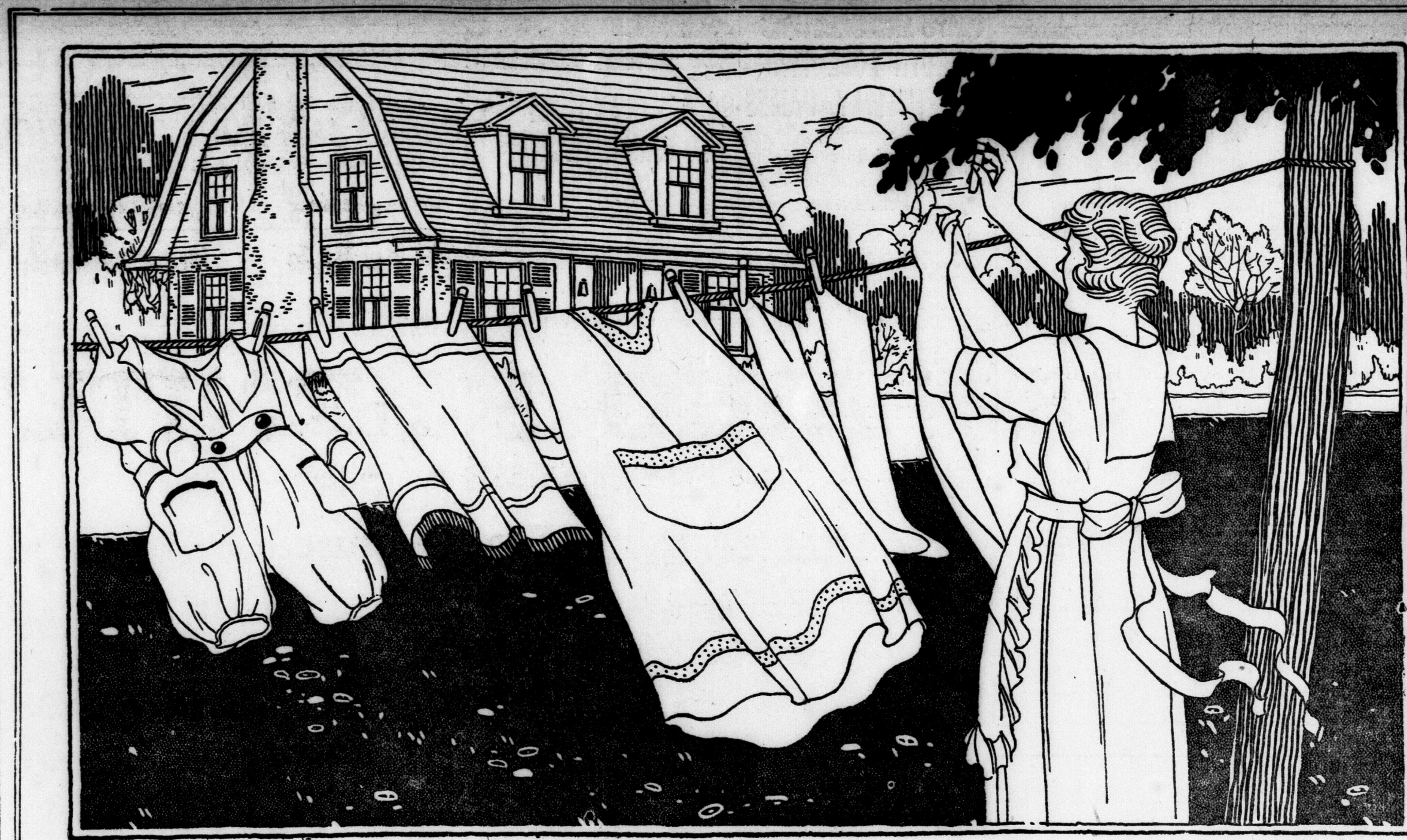
Applications from Maurice Gushier and Mrs. Joseph for naturalization were then heard.

The suit of James McFarlane of East Williams against John D. McVicar of Perth for \$100 damages and costs was ordered by the judge to be held in abeyance for postponement.

At the time of going to press the jury was being sworn in. If the grand jury brings in true bills in the two criminal cases stated, these will be proceeded with by the judge and jury Wednesday morning.

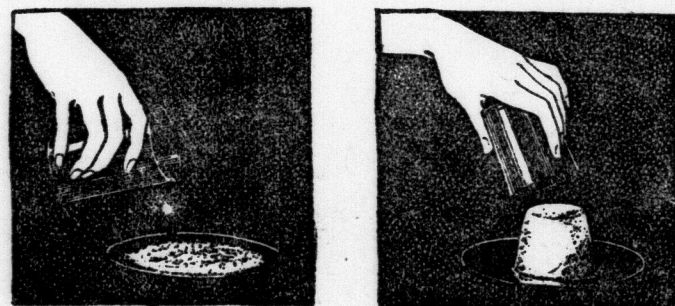

**WHO WILL WIN?**  
London, June 1.—(By Canadian Press).—Who is going to win the Derby tomorrow? That is the engrossing question of the hour—in the clubs, on change, among the little punters all

over the country, and most of all at Epsom itself, where the annual meeting opened today on the famous course. For the Derby, though not the oldest of the five classic races, having been run continuously since 1780, whereas the Oaks has been run since 1779. The St. Leger, 1776, is by far the most popular race run on the flat in England and has an atmosphere all its own.

Situated within a few miles of Box Hill, it each year attracts a great crowd of whom a big proportion never see another race the season through, and there is not a sportsman in the land, whether he sits in the House of

Commons or drives a coster's donkey but does not have something on his favorite, Manner D. McCalmont's grey colt, Tetraema, by the Tetrarch-Scotch Gift, is today a firm favorite, but nevertheless there have been disquieting rumors, and Mr. Raphael's Albany, who ran Tetraema to half a length in the two thousand guineas at Newmarket, has a strong following.
