Company Preferred Compromise to a Vote of the Ratepayers.

INGERSOLL, Nov. 2.—Following an hour and a half of discussion at the adjourned meeting of the court of revision tonight the officials of the water works company have agreed to settle the gas rate question.

The settlement was made between John Howell, land and tax agent, of Buffalo, G. M. Gale, superintendent of the district, Brantford, and W. C. Hoard, constructive foreman.

During the meeting attention was called to the fact that the increase of the gas rate to 85 cents as most unfair.
