Hamilton, June 4.—A record in the new International League was made here yesterday afternoon in the game between Hamilton and London. It was a 17-innings affair, and Hamilton won out through the Londoners' lead becoming rattled at a critical time. At the third inning the score was 6-6, and neither team scored for seven innings. In the seventh the Londoners were blanked, although two men got free transportation and one got a hit. The first man who walked was caught stealing second. With two men on bases, Lee, the new fielder, who did swell work with the willow, was struck out. The Hams went in amid loud cheering.

Muir got to first on an error of the pitcher. The next man got first on an error by the shortstop, and the third reached the initial sack on an error of the catcher. This was a wild throw that allowed Curtis to score, and win the game for Hamilton. The game lasted till 7 o'clock.

KILL WINTERS RACING

Louisiana Has a Measure To End Racing at New Orleans.

Baton Rouge, La., June 3.—At a meeting of the joint judiciary committee of the House of Representatives of the Louisiana Assembly today the bill prohibiting bookmaking and other forms of gambling at racetracks received a favorable report. Out of 32 members present, 27 declared in favor of the measure. The bill, if passed, will in effect abolish the long racing season which has marked the winter in New Orleans for many years.

CLEVELAND NAPS FALL TO WILLET

Tigers Get To Addie Joss in Final Rounds By Striking Finish.

Detroit, June 3.—The Tigers finally triumphed over the Naps in the final round of the series, two to one, but they had a hard time doing it. Addie Joss was in the box against them and it was only by a determined stand in the final rounds that they could beat the peerless Cleveland pitcher. Eddie Willett opposed the great Joss and pitched a masterful game. The youngster held the Naps to six hits, at no time during the nine innings allowing any more than one hit in a round. A base on balls, a Naps' pitch and a timely hit gave the Naps the only run they could make off him. The Kansas man was at his best and henceforth will take place with Summers as one of the regulars of the staff.

It was only one of those Tiger finishes that rolled back the Naps. Willett not only held the Naps from crossing the plate by his pitching but he was leading in their downfall at last by starting the inning which tied the score.

Several times threatened, but each time the battered infield of the Tigers came through strong and with Willett doing his best battles were cut off. The Tigers in the same way narrowly missed scoring several times. This season's work has been a fast, clean contest from start to finish.
