



MRS. KUHRING IS RE-ELECTED

Annual Meeting of the Women's

At the annual meeting of the Women's
Canadian Club held last night in the

Society, there was a large attendance.

chair. Reports of the work done during
the past year were read and unani-
mously adopted. These included the re-
ports of the recording secretary, Mrs.
McLure; treasurer, Miss McGovern; con-
vener of hall committee, Miss Grace
Leavitt; read by Mrs. L. P. D. Tilley
in her unavoidable absence; convener of

The president read letters of regret

Seven new members were elected.

In opening the proceedings, the pres-
ident, after reporting the sending of a
cable message of loyalty to the king on
Trafalgar day, read his majesty's reply
cabled on the same day. This was in the
following terms:

"To President Women's Canadian Club,
St. John.

"I am commanded by the king to
thank the members of the Women's
Canadian Club, St. John, New Brun-
swick, for their kind telegram on this
anniversary of Trafalgar day. His
majesty greatly appreciates the assur-
ances of loyalty and devotion to which
the message gives expression.

A resolution was passed thanking Mrs.
Chisholm, the ladies' orchestra and the
other ladies, also the boys' orchestra for
providing music at past gatherings.

Sympathy was expressed by resolution
with the parents of the late Ralph Cre-
ford.

Other resolutions passed included
one confirming the proposal to hold an
exhibition of war trophies, photographs of
soldiers, maps and other articles of
interest in connection with the war. The
following committee were appointed to
forward the objects of the exhibition:

T. H. Eatabrook gave a short address
in favor of the formation of committees
of women to aid in the recruiting move-
ment. His suggestions being favorably re-
ceived.

Music during the proceedings was pro-
vided by Mrs. B. L. Gerow, Stanley
Chambers and Miss Saunders.

The president's address read before
the election of officers was in part as
follows:

"We come together tonight under ex-
ceptional circumstances. The work of
all societies this year is and must con-
tinue to be of one character. One ter-
rible subject fills all our thoughts and
calls for every effort—the war. If we
as a club have taken our place side by
side in this community with all those
who with pain in their hearts but clear
courage and determination, have not
turned back in the day of battle, but

IS SUICIDE ON THE EVE OF HIS WEDDING

Philadelphia, Oct. 26.—The mystery of
the disappearance of a young man from
New Haven, Conn., on the eve of his wed-
ding, J. Herman, adopted son of a weal-
thy manufacturer, George M. Griswold,
has been solved by Deputy Coroner Mc-
Keever.

Herman was a suicide, was found in
a room in the Hotel Hamilton, where he
registered as J. H. Husted, Trenton,
N. J. McKeever found several cards in
the man's clothing bearing the name of
Harvey J. Herman and also a wallet con-
