DEMOCRATS MAY YET Disorders In Italy Follow Attempt On Mussolini's Life CAPTURE THE SENATE; PETITION FOR RECALL IS WITHDRAWN **CUT HOUSE MAJORITY**

Little Group of Seven Insurgent Republican Senators Will Wield Deciding Power, Election Results Reveal

"AL" SMITH RE-ELECTED IN NEW YORK

Democrats Made Five Gains in Senate and Must Capture Four Out of Five Doubtful Seats to Dominate-Prohibition Referenda Results

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The squall that rocked the Republican brig yesterday washed away most of the party's majority in the Senate, reduced its margin in the House, and still was giving a scare today to some of the crew of stalwarts.

Democrats have made five gains from Republicans in the Senate - Massachusetts, New York, Kentucky, Oklahoma and Arizona-and must win four of the five doubtful seats to wrest control of the upper house from the administration party. Doubtful seats are Indiana, Maryland, Missouri, Oregon and Colorado.

Total membership of the Senate is 96. Democrats have gained nine seats from the Republicans in the lower house, where the membership is 435. They must gain 27 more to gain control and this is regarded as unlikely. More than 50 constituencies have not yet reported complete figures.


