

ASK C. N. R. FOR STEEL CONTRACTS

Sydney Delegation Waits on Sir Henry Thornton—Other Matters.

Sydney, N. S., Nov. 28.—That the Canadian National Railways purchase in Canada all steel used by the C. N. R. in the Dominion was a statement made by Sir Henry W. Thornton, president of the C. N. R. to the Board of Trade here yesterday in response to a request that further orders for steel be placed as soon as possible with the Sydney company. Sir Henry further said that this policy was one which the C. N. R. proposed to adhere to and he gave the promise that as much steel as their circumstances permitted would be ordered from this section of the country but that the other companies in Canada manufacturing the same product must receive equal consideration when the placing of steel contracts was under advisement.

The president, with the directors and officers accompanying him, spent a busy day in this area. They arrived at North Sydney during the morning and met the Board of Trade at that point. Requests for terminals facilities were made. From North Sydney the party proceeded to Sydney where the Board of Trade made enquiries as to the intentions of the railways in regard to

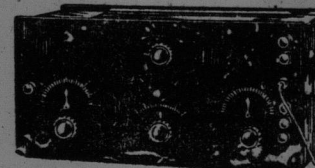

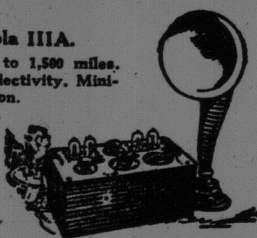
