FIND TEACHER STOLE NICKELS

Brooklyn Man Had Unusual Scheme For Robbing Telephone Boxes.

New York, Feb. 29.—Joseph Friedman, 40, a manual training teacher in Brooklyn public schools for 19 years, was found guilty before Justice Herbert McInerney in special sessions of stealing 40 cents in marked nickels from a telephone box in the Grand Central terminal.

Entering a booth when he thought no one was watching, Friedman would insert a piece of cardboard into the return chute. The first nickel returned because of an incomplete call lodged against this and those subsequently returned piled up behind it.

Montreal Looks For Record Year

Montreal, Feb. 29.—Every available foot of docking space in the harbor of Montreal has been leased for the 1924 season. M. P. Fennell, secretary of the port, announced yesterday, who added that all indications pointed to a record season this year. Applications had been received for seventy more sheds than the harbor possesses. Two new sheds will be completed in time for the opening of navigation, said Mr. Fennell.

Belgian Princess Is Seriously Ill

Paris, Feb. 29.—Princess Louise of Belgium, cousin of King Albert, is seriously ill at Westbaden, according to dispatches received here. She is 66 years of age, but her fine constitution still permits hope for her recovery. It is said the Belgian court, however, has been informed and her daughter, Duchess Dorothea of Schleswig-Holstein, has been summoned.
