TEX RICKARD SUE
FOR AN ACCOUNTING

Sports Promoter Denies That
Frank C. Armstrong is a
Partner—Will Fight, He
Says.

(N. Y. Times.)

Frank C. Armstrong, alleging that he
has been an equal partner with Tex
Rickard in all of his enterprises for the
past ten years, including the lease of
Madison Square Garden for boxing ex-
hibitions, filed suit in the Supreme Court
yesterday against Rickard for an ac-
counting of his half of the profits. On
the ground that Rickard is taking his
money out of the state to invest in out-
side enterprises and may not have any
property here to satisfy any judgment
that Armstrong may obtain, the com-
plaint filed yesterday asked for the ap-
pointment of a receiver of Rickard's
property and for an injunction restrain-
ing him from taking his property out of

the state and from dissipating his as-
sets.

The complaint filed by T. J. O'Neill
for Armstrong alleges that before 1910
and 1920 Rickard and Armstrong were
associated in joint ventures and in May
last Rickard told him he had an oppor-
tunity to lease Madison Square Garden
for boxing exhibitions but needed aid in
putting through the lease. Armstrong
says he told Rickard he believed he could
get a lease of the Garden from the New
York Life Insurance Company, the own-
er, and it was agreed that if the lease
was executed the two would be partners,
but Armstrong was willing to give Rickard
10 per cent. of the net profits for his
services in operating the Garden, and it
was agreed that the other net profits
would be divided equally.

Armstrong alleges that he had a copy
of the proposed lease, but that Rickard
obtained it on July 10 last and has kept
the lease, and that to deprive the plain-
tiff of the proposed lease, he had organ-
ized several corporations to take over the
lease and operate the Garden. He charges
that Rickard had made large profits,
but refuses to give the plaintiff a cent.
Armstrong alleges that he ad-
vanced large sums for various Rickard
enterprises. He believes that the lease of
the Garden was made for \$200,000 rent.
"Armstrong is not a partner of mine,
and never was," said Rickard last night.
"The only thing of mine he ever went
into was the Texas Oil Company, and he
is the only man who made any money
out of it, because he sold stock to the
public at a big profit. He had nothing
to do with the Garden lease, although
he might have seen it, and he is merely
one of about a million persons who have
been trying to cut in on me. I will file a
denial and will fight the suit to the end."
