### LEGISLATION AFFECTING

Washington, April 18—The incorporation of stock exchanges listing securities of inter-state corporations, under penalty of being barred from the use of mails and telegraph services, is proposed in a bill introduced by Representative Neilly, of Kansas, a member of the Pujo money trust investigating committee. The bill would impose severe penalties on stock exchange officials, brokers or telegraph company officials who transmit between states any business of an unincorporated exchange and would give the postmaster-general authority to regulate transactions on stock exchanges, with particular prohibitions against "wash sales" and other manipulative transactions
