Tokio, April 18.—A demand that the Japanese government resort to arms was hysterically cheered at a mass meeting here last night to protest against the alien land bill now before the California legislature.

Twenty thousand persons assembled. The speakers denounced the submissive attitude of the government.

The responsible newspapers of Tokio, in commenting editorially on the meeting denounced the proceedings as undignified and unworthy of the nation, describing them as merely an outburst of the unthinking extreme element incited by political demagogues.
