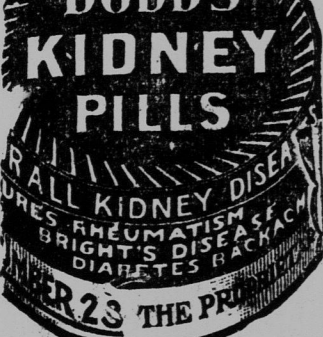

RECENT WEDDINGS

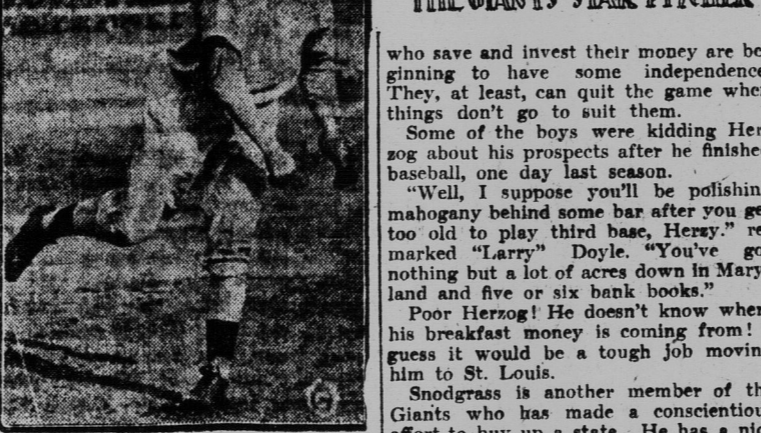
