### ORANGEMEN GO TO ST. DAVID'S FOR SERVICE

Plans Are Completed for Observance of July 12 Here

### PROCESSION TO CHURCH PLANNED

Lorneville to Organize L. O. B. A.—Mayor Is Among Speakers.

Arrangements for a church parade in observance of July 12 were made by the Orange lodges of the city at a meeting of representatives of the lodges last night.

The service will be held at St. David's church, and the sermon will be preached by Rev. Hugh Miller. The members of the seven lodges of ladies will meet at the church in regalia, and will be seated in a section reserved for them.

### MEETING PLANS

The North End and West Side lodges will meet at the Simons street hall and, accompanied by the Saint John County (West) Lodge and headed by the Carleton County Band, will march from there. The city lodges, with the two Black Preceptories and the Scarlet Chapter, will meet at the Germania street hall and march from there by way of Germania and Union, to Dock street, where they will join with the North End contingent and march together to the church. The lodges 8, 11 and 14, and those meeting at Germania street will be Nos. 1, 3, 24 and 27.

### NEW LODGE L. O. B. A.

An L. O. B. A. Lodge will be organized in Lorneville soon, it was announced at a meeting in the Orange Hall at Lorneville last evening. The purpose of the meeting was to secure new members for Mount Purple Lodge No. 29, L. O. B. A., and to get the nucleus of a ladies' organization. John Ferguson, worshipful master, called the meeting. His Worship Mayor F. L. Potts, Councilor W. Golding, county master; W. J. McAllister, past county master; Dr. J. H. Barton, William T. Ready and Rev. Peter Jackson, were present. The order was pronounced and the deputy of the L. O. B. A., with representatives from Willis Lodge, No. 70, L. O. B. A., Baxter, Fairmount, Dominion, Roxborough and Fairmount Lodges, L. O. B. A., were present. Councilor Golding was called to the chair and presented, on behalf of the Counted Lodge, a handsome Orange collar to W. J. McAllister, who is now past county master.

### MAYOR'S OFFER

His Worship, in urging the ladies to form an auxiliary, said that he would pay the fees of the first ten who would show their desire to join. More than ten were speedily taken down on the list. His Worship also suggested that the order pay for the tuition of a talented child of working people, or one that was orphan.

Mrs. Taggart, praised Fairmount Lodge of East Saint John, which she said had made wonderful strides in less than a year.

Rev. Mr. Jackson said that if the members lived up to Orangism they would be strong spiritually, for the order was founded upon Bible teaching.

A short programme with Piper Stewart, Gifford Lawrence, J. Sergeant, Wm. Keir, Wm. Ewart, Rev. Mr. Jackson and Dr. Barton, concluded the evening. The men of Mount Purple Lodge served refreshments, assisted by the ladies. Cullum Lodge, L. O. B. A., met last evening. Mrs. D. J. Lewett, worthy mistress, presided and Mrs. J. Powers, mistress of ceremonies, conducted several initiations. Plans were made to hold a concert next month.

### GOES TO JAIL ON 2 MONTH SENTENCE

"Now Are You Satisfied" is Sebury's Query to Wife as He Goes to Cell.

"Now, are you satisfied?" asked William Sebury, 47 Broadview avenue, of his wife as he passed her in the witness stand on his way from the police court room to a cell to serve a two months' sentence without option of a fine. He had been found guilty of assaulting his wife. "Yes, I am," was her response.

Giving evidence, Mrs. Sebury said that he returned home last night in a drunken state and proceeded to wreck things. She said he threatened her life, and she declared she was tired of him and would never live with him again. Asked if he had anything to say, accused said he did not remember anything about it, as he must have been drunk. A two-months sentence was imposed.

### BOND BID ACCEPTED

Eastern Securities Get Municipality Issue—Sinking Fund Reserve Made.

The bid of the Eastern Securities of 100.35 for the 20-year 5 per cent. bonds and 99.07 for the 5 per cent. serial bonds sold by the municipality of the City and County of Saint John, being the highest received, has been accepted by the committee of the council having this matter in charge. Of the amount offered, \$89,776 of the serial bonds have been reserved by the council for the sinking fund, and the balance of the issue of \$110,345, \$70,569 has been taken over by the Eastern Securities Company.

### Boys Steal Boat and Travel; Adventure Ends in Court

Three young lads in search of adventure left their homes yesterday morning but fell into bad ways and last night were arrested by local detectives on two theft charges. This morning they appeared in the police court accompanied by their mothers, who were reduced to tears at the plight of their children. All pleaded with Magistrate Henderson not to send them to the Boys' Industrial Home, but give them one more chance. On receiving the assurance from the boys and the parents that it would not happen again, His Honor said he would allow the charge to stand.

According to the police, the boys first stole a small rowboat at Marble Cove, the property of D. Pitt, and paddled their way across the river with some sticks. Landing on the other side, they stole a pair of oars and then rowed up the river to Moria station, where they noticed a package. Opening it, they found some silverware and then tried to sell it. In the meantime, the police had been notified and followed them. They were found struggling to get a handcar on the rails to ride into the city. Fortunately for them they were caught by Detective Sgt. Power, Detectives Biddiscombe and Saunders as they might have been killed by the Montreal train which passed that spot not many minutes later.

LONDON, May 13.—The British Labor party has decided to accept the official Russian invitation to send a deputation to Russia this summer. Its purpose will be to study the possibilities of an improvement in Anglo-Saxon trade.

#### WAS FOUND IN BARN

Adjudged guilty on her own confession of being a loose, idle person, Nellie Logan appeared before Magistrate Henderson in the police court this morning and was remanded until further inquiries could be made. Police Sergeant Sullivan said that in consequence of a complaint he had found Logan in a barn early this morning.

#### OFF UNTIL JUNE 8

Adjournment until June 8 of the hearing into the claim of the Ingwood Pulp and Paper Co., Ltd., against the workmen of the Electric Power Commission was ordered by Mr. Justice LeBlanc, special arbitrator, at Moncton yesterday. The place where the hearing will be resumed has not been decided yet.

#### BOYS IN COURT

Four juveniles were before Magistrate Henderson in the police court this morning on a charge of throwing stones in Elliott row. The father of two of the boys said the lads probably were guilty, but he would undertake to see that the practice was stopped. These two boys were allowed to go with a warning. The mother of the other two boys, however, insisted there must be a mistake about her boys, and the magistrate set the case over until Saturday morning.

#### KINGS CO. WILL CASE

Hearing of evidence in connection with the will of the late Archibald Seely, farmer of Land's End, Kings county, was completed in the Kings county Probate Court on Monday before Judge Freeze. Evidence in opposition to the will was given by George E. Seely and Harry Seely, while J. J. Seely, Mrs. Annie Shanks and Mrs. Ethel McAllister testified in support of the will. Argument will be made later. G. Earle Logan appeared for the executors in support of the will. J. Frank Frauley acted for the next of kin in support of the will, and G. H. V. Belyea appeared for those opposing the will.

#### WARSHIP VISIT

A letter was received this morning by Mayor Potts from Colonel Murray MacLaren, M. P., in connection with the visit of the North Atlantic fleet to Canadian waters. He wrote that he would be visiting Canada this year, as the other two cruisers, the Constant and the Carleton Place, were going to be re-commissioned. The request of the Mayor that the fleet visit Saint John had been referred to the commander-in-chief of the North American and West Indian fleet.

### HAVE PAID \$52,600 ON CONTRACT PRICE

Report on Status of Court House Restoration is Made by Architect.

An interesting report on the contracts for the court house and its progress to date was submitted to the municipal council yesterday by the architect, Garnet W. Wilson. To the contract price for the building is to be added the cost of furnishing the court rooms and offices. The furnishings for the court rooms are contracted for at a cost of \$71,084.41, but the contracts for the furnishings of the offices and law library have not yet been let.

When the work was authorized an issue of \$75,000 bonds was passed with a limit of expenditure of \$85,000.

The building is insured for \$23,000 as called for by terms of contract, and the contractor is bonded with The Canada Accident Co. for 50 per cent. of the amount of contract. The general contractor has been instructed to cover the lower chieft of top pediment over front entrance with copper, set on slant to prevent menace of pigeons.

#### Delays

The work of structural steel, masonry, and plastering is about completed. The work of lobby tiling is still to be done. The materials for interior wood finish are all in the building, and are being set up. The work of other trades, except interior painting, is well advanced.

There were delays in the work, caused principally by the delay in delivery of structural steel, and delay in delivery of metal windows, as mentioned in my report of Jan. 6 last. The delays have caused the time for completion of contract to run beyond April 15, 1925, the time set by contract.

### W. J. PORTER DEAD

Returned Man Belonged to Westfield and Held in High Esteem.

An unexpected bereavement has come to a Westfield family in the death of Wellesley John Porter, who passed away at the General Public Hospital last evening, in his 32nd year, after a short illness following a grave operation. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frederick W. Porter, formerly of Gagetown, and was one of three brothers, Gerald, Talnage and Wellesley. The latter was the eldest. Talnage fell on the field of honor in the Great War, and Wellesley also was overseas with the Canadian forces. Since his return he had been in the employ of McDonald Brothers, lumber merchants of Grand Bay. His untiring energy and cheerful devotion to duty were characteristics of his everyday life.

More than a year ago he married Miss Rose Bennett of Saint John, and is survived by his wife and baby daughter, Doreen Constance. His sisters are Mrs. Horatio Demmings of Chipman, Mrs. Urban V. Caulfield of Grand Bay, Mrs. Osborne M. Blanchard of Hobe, Maine, and, at home, the Misses Vivian and Myrtle Porter.

Mr. Porter's death has cast a gloom upon the life of Westfield, where he was well known and highly esteemed. The funeral will be from St. James' Anglican church at Westfield on Friday afternoon, with service at the church at 3 o'clock, daylight time.
